PREVENTING FRONT WHEEL SHIMMY FROM BLOW OUT PATCH - When a blow-out patch is used in a front wheel tire of an auto, it is thrown out of balance by the weight of the patch, which may cause it to shimmy. This is overcome by using a patch of the same weight on the opposit side of the wheel.
