"Everything you wanted to know about Serounging, but were a raid to try" Most important, you must understand that you won't ever get "something for nothing". No one is going to give you an Early V-8 or parts unless it's your Old Uncle Harry who is on his death bed and wills it to you. However, you can bargan and horse-trada your way into a good deal if you know how to play the same. Contrary to popular belief it is a good idea to take some one along with you when serounging. Not only from a safety standpoint, but a good extra pair of eyes can more than pay for themselves in a good find you might have missed looking the other way. Also ... . Don't expect to find a Goodie just laying by the roadside. They are few and far between. Be prepared to play detective and have a "Poker Fage", especially when someone reveals a find to you. If you burn the deal by getting excited you can be sure that by the time you get to the prospective seller he will have received a phone call that he has a "live one" on the way over. The best way to throw them off the track is to act like you could care less. Example: Someone tells you of an old '40 Ford Convertable up the road. You say: "Aw, that's too bad, I was really looking for something a little older than that, but I might take a look at it as long as I'm out this way". This will put them off guard especially if all you want to do is take a picture of it for your scrapbook. After you arrive you can "become interested". Remember. let them sell you the car. Don't walk around it saying Hamasa. That's not a Gennie hub cap and that's the wrong bumper, etc. This will tip your hand that you know something. Take the time to listen to the old story of how they only used it gor short trips to the city, etc. It will build their feeling of confidence in you, and get you a better deal in the end. Of course each situation is different, but you'll get the know how from experience. Here is a list of hints I have found to be heapful in my Serounsing: 1. A pick-up truck or station wason are your best bet for transportation. The older the better. Don't tow a trailer as you will be advertising the fact that you're looking. Just make it seem that you are "passing through town". 2. Unless you travel close to towns, take along extra food, water and warm clothing (even in summer the nights can get pretty cold in outlying places.) 3. You must have a camera, extra film and flashbulbs. (in case you find any Little Old Ladies with dark barns.) Also paper, notebook, pensils and pens. 4. Check out the location of police and hospitals in far away places as it could save your life knowing which way to go should you need help. 5. Bring your own maps of the community of town you visit, don't trust your luck to local gas stations which what to closed! 6. Don't waste time and gas just wandering Go directly to gas stations and garages and ask for the nearest junk yard or customer with an old Ford. 7. Check for "Goodwill", #Salvations Army" and other "Thrift" shops. These are always an excellent source for cheap book and literature. 8. Check the local phone books for listing of old Pep Boys and Western Auto Stores. Sometimes they will make you a "package Deal" to get rid of a lot of their old stock to get more shelf space. 9. Avoid all "Antique" stores. They are a rip-off unless you know what you are doing, or the owner doesn't know what he has. Watch your wallet: 10. Cheek out old r dio and TV shops. Many have back rooms full of old car radios and tubes. Again you might get a package weal to clean him out. 11. Look up old Ford dealers or ask around if you don't

see one. I once found an old "Ford Parts" sign in a Pontiae agency (formerly a Ford Dealer.) 12. Ask everyone you talk to of any old Fords they know of., and follow all leads! I was told once where I might find an old '53 Studebaker, and after a ten minute drive was rewarded by finding instead a '55 Thunderbird!! 13. If it comes to a choice, try for open ears first (roadster, convertibles, phaetons, etc. then station wagons or wood side sportsmans, coupes tudors and last forder sedens. If you spot something you might not like yourself, write it down anyway, as it may be worth a finders' fee to tell someone else. (Ed. note: Or trading material!) 14. Last, remember before you part with your hardearned bucks, it's cheaper to pay for a running car even if it costs a little more than to grab a bargin basket case which will cost you sometimes more to get in shape than the initial investment on the running car. 
