RECIPE TIME !!!!!!

For those people who attended the March meeting, sampled the apple spice cake at the break, and were simply dying to obtain that recipe--- here it is, thanks to MARLENE NORDBERG.

OLE FASHIONED APPLE CAKE**** Take one package of Duncan Hines SPICE CAKE mix. One can (1 lb. 5 oz.) apple pie filling Three eggs Three tablespoons of water to cup chopped nuts FOR THE TOPPING** You need-ż cup sugar, ż cup flour, ż teaspoon cinnamon, and 1 cup (2 stick butter or margerine) softened. Preheat the oven to 350. In a large bowl combine dry cake mix, pie filling, eggs, water, and nuts. Blend at low speed until completely moistened, about one minute. Beat two minutes at medium speed. Spread batter in a greased and floured pan- 13"X9"X2". For the TOPPING. In a medium bowl combine the sugar, flour, cinnamon, and softened butter with a fork. (mixture will be crumbly) Sprinkle evenly over the batter. Bake it at 350 for 40 to 45 minutes. Once this is done and the cake cools, sit down with a big spoon and eat it all up. OH, MY -- What did I say??

***** A DAY TO REMEMBER, BUT ONE YOU WANT TO FORGET **** A TRAGEDY Your editor was a first hand witness to a tragic event which occurred recently and greatly affected the plans of our past president, Doug Peterson. I will relate the story to you here. On March 10th there was a swapmeet held at the Pomona fairgrounds. Doug planned to take his 1934 Ford Victoria there as it was for sale. I had previously asked Doug if I could go along with him and would help out wherever I could. We had agreed to meet at Doug's house very early onthat Sunday morning. Doug borrowed the car trailer from member Jack Miles and had the car ready and secured on the trailed by Saturday. On Sunday morning I was at Dougs at 6 o'clock am and we started out for Pomona. The drive was uneventful and the car with the trailer handled well on both surface streets and on the freeway. As we neared Pomona we missed the offramp which led to the swapmeet so Doug got off at the next offramp and we got back on the freeway. He drove off at the correct offramp and we proceeded down the road towards the fairgrounds. Suddenly, and without warning, there was a loud snap, a lurch, and Doug exclaimed, "there goes the car". Our speed was about 40 mph at the time. We pulled over and stopped and could only watch with dismay as the trailer, with the 134, roll by. It was almost like slow motion to me. The trailer crossed three lanes of the road and seemed to gater speed. Off onto the shoulder it went and down into a water filled ditch. The trailer dug its tongue into the rainsoftened embankment. And then, the comealongs popped which held the car to the trailer. The '34 continued on as momentum carried it from the trailer. The car went up on its side and almost over onto its top. We ran from the two car and saw that the front wishbone had come undone at the ball and had twisted the front axle 90 degrees, snapping the spring and perches. It was a disaster! As it was only about 7:30 in the morning, the only people around were the early golfers on the course along the road. (No help from those guys!!) People who were headed for the swapmeet began to stop. Two fellows in a van stopped and with the truck and a rope, we managed to pull the trailer back up onto the shoulder of the road. An inspection of the trailer revealed it to be alright with only minor damage to the fender and some plywood. We then discovered the reason for losing the trailer --- the entire ball hitch had snapped from Doug's Pontiac. To then make everyone edgy, a Pomona police car pulled up and the officer enquired about what had happened. Doug exhibited, in my opinion, an amazing amount of patience and control. Nevertheless, the officer radioed for a tow truck to help get the '34 out of the ditch. I, in turn, went through the area looking for people I knew to ask if they would help put the car back on jtthe trailer when Doug came back. In about two hours he was back with the trailer in tow. We rounded up Gordie Chamberlin, Bob Kennedy and Reggie Mayfield and went to where the car was still standing. We pushed that beast up onto the trailer and Doug fastened it down again. After this was done, we started out for home. While we were still there along the the road, a fellow stopped and made Doug a fair offer for the car as it stood. At first Doug decided to accept and was going to deliver the car to the man. On our way home the trailer handled very poorly. It began to whip around when our speed reached 45 mph. Needless to say, I very quite nervous during the trip home, thinking about what happened to another member, Don Durkee and his mishap coming home from Santa Rosa in 1972. Our annual joint tour with the Southern California Regional Group will be completely different this year. We will eat breakfast at a new place, enjoy a new tour route, and picnic at a new (to most of us) place. The

tour will be almost exactly 200 miles in length and thus will be held on a Saturday rather than a Sunday, considering the availability of gas. The date is the 20th of April. I ran the entire tour route on Washington's birthday and have arranged for a scenic route and stops to satisfy all interests, plus a nice picnic spot. If buying your lunch is your desire there is a nearby restaurant to fit your needs.

In past years we have traditionally attended the Antique Drags at the Orange County Raceway. I have been told that they will no longer be staging this event and so it was decided to embark an an entirely new joint tour. As mentioned above, there will be service stations open along the tour route. However, considering the long lines a accompanying delays experienced at trying to buy gas these days, it is strongly suggested that each participant take it upon himself to carry spare fuel or in some way arrange to make the trip so that a service station stop is not necessary. Due to the length of the tour it would be impractical to attempt to schedule in a regular service station stop.

Following is a brief outline of the meeting place, stops, and general agenda of the tour.

Saturday, April 20th - Meet at the May Co. parking lot in Fashion Valley at 7 AM. Tour leaves May Co. promptly at 7:30 AM.

Tour north on I-5 with one rest stop at rest area north of Oceanside.

Restaurant in El Toro at the El Toro Rd off ramp.
(This is a cafeteria style restaurant and we will
have a private room for V-Sers).

After breakfast at Toppers we will tour south to La Paz, then take country roads thru very pretty Mission Viejo area to the Ortega Highway.

We will tour over the Ortega Highway to Lake Elsinore and then head south, stopping at the small town of Murietta where there is a very interesting antique shop. As I was looking things over there I found a very nice '38 speedometer on one of the shelves.
