The tour wound through Beverly Hills and stopped then at a private club called the Speakeasy where everyone had an entertaining time. After some time there, the group toured back and then home. THE 1974 WESTERN REGIONAL MEET

The much looked forward to meet is now a pleasant memory and for those members of our chapter who were unable to attend, here is a brief account of what went on. We, my wife and I, pulled into Balboa Park in our 1939 Ford about 9:00 a.m. and were greeted with the sight of 7 or 8 early V8s lined up and ready to go. What happened then was the greatest disappearing act of V8s ever witnessed. It was impossible to get onto the Ventura Freeway as a group as the traffic and the lights didn't cooperate. It wasn't until we were on the Golden State Freeway at Griffith Park that we saw Bob Wilson's 1935 Ford and Doug Peterson's 1934 Ford truck in traffic. We drove with them to Cars of the Stars in Buena Park, where, as I was getting gasoline, I had a some small problems with leaking netrol. This was renaired and I joined in with a group of about 12 cars which left Buena Park at about 10:20 a.m. and toured south to San Diego. As we entered the city, our line of cars followed a neat yellow 1940 Ford convertible right to the Bahia. There were scores of early V8s all over the place. We all registered at the desk and afterwards went to pick up the packet which the San Diego group had prepared for each paid attending member.

On disply at the front of the hotel complex were a beautifully restored 1932 Ford roadster (which was for sale too, and I heard the price was \$20,000.00) and a 1948 Ford Sportsman. These beautiful cars represented the cars which encompass the years our club accepts in the membership.

We found some friends from Sonoma, the Ottmans who are ex members of our chapter, who had driven their 1932 Ford coupe there and we all walked around the area to see all those cars. There were so many I couldn't count them all. There were seminars that afternoon and for the gals, a bus was available at 2:00 p.m. to take them to San Diego's Old Town for lunch and shopping. There was much activity in the area in the preparation of the cars for Saturdays concours. Saturday morning found the cars and trucks being given their final cleaning and then driven onto the grass display area where a photographer took a picture of each vehicle. There were some really fantastic V8s to be judged and there were even more which didn't enter the competition. San Diego had something new in that there were several restored commercial vehicles on display which really caught our eyes. There was a 1935 Ford panel delivery, a 1939 Ford dual rear wheeled stake bed, a 1942 Ford 12 ton flat bed, a 1940 Ford sedan delivery, a 1935 Ford flat bed, and some very sharp pickups (including Doug Petersons). These early V8 trucks are coming up in the world as indicated in the interest shown them. There was also voting by popular vote for the Ladies Choice and for the Most Unusual V8. The Ladies Choice went to a 1935 Ford phaeton with a trunk belonging to J.L. Ballard of northern California. Mr. Ballard's father, who everyone called Grandpa, is the national clubs oldest member at 81. Grandpa drove his 1941

Ford convertible to the meet. It was said that this car was Chevy powered????? The most unusual V8 award was given to a beautiful light blue 1976 Jensen-Ford.

While all the judging was going on throughout the day, the women went to a luncheon and fashion show. The fashions shown were from the 1930s and 1940s and all who attended were treated to a very good show.

Prior to the dinner saturday night there was a cocktail hour and you could inspect the many displays of V8 items which San Diego had set up. They all were very impressive.

At the awards banquet, which was held in a magnificent blue ballroom, we found that members of our own Valley V8s faired rather well in the competion with five trophies awarded to individuals mentioned previously. I might add that Ted Martin's award was for the most original class of early V8s.

Our own Gordie Chamberlin was presented a special award for the best dressed person for the occasion. Gordie was resplendid in a 1940s style ZOOT SUIT at the banquet. The suit was a pin striped gray with tremendous shoulders. The jacket length was down about the knees. The very baggy pants were also cut very narrow at the cuff. His green leather shoes were OUT OF SIGHT! His shirt was pink and his tie was green. The wide brimmed hat was pulled down just above the eyebrows and he ceremoniously twirled a long gold chain which was attached to his belt. Gordie and Floss also were celebrating their 18th wedding anniversary that evening and Gordie was ready for that ride down memory lane dressed as he was. The GRAND PRIZE 1940 Ford car was given away that night also and the winner was a 10 year old girl from Temple City. Bob Drake was there, sporting a T-shirt that was very unusual as it lampooned Bill Norton of Valley Obselete. As the morning wore on, more and more V8s, packed and ready to go slowly drove out of the complex to the waves of goodbye from old and new found friends.

We left about 2:00 p.m. with four other V8s from our chapter and arrived home about 6:30. No one in our small tour home experienced any difficulties at the end of a near perfect meet.
