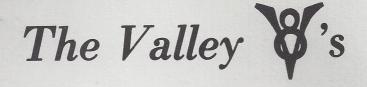

MARY 36

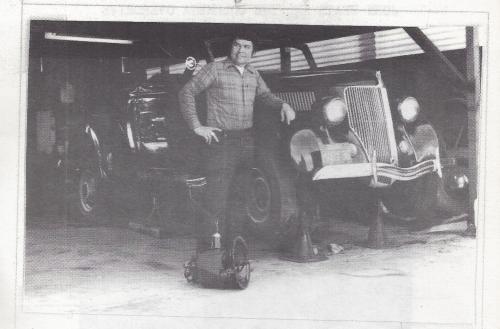

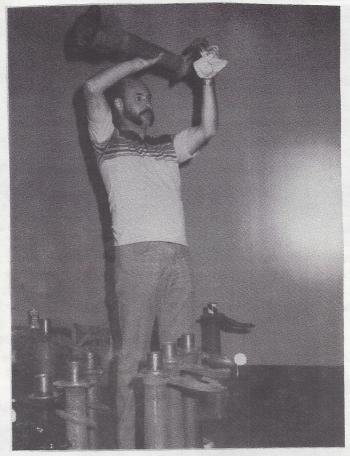


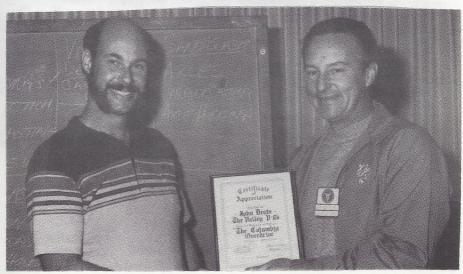
Don with his arm around Mary 36

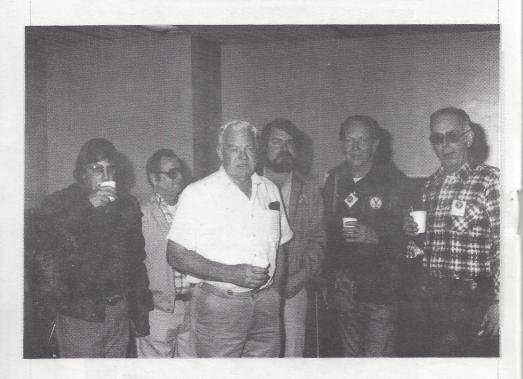

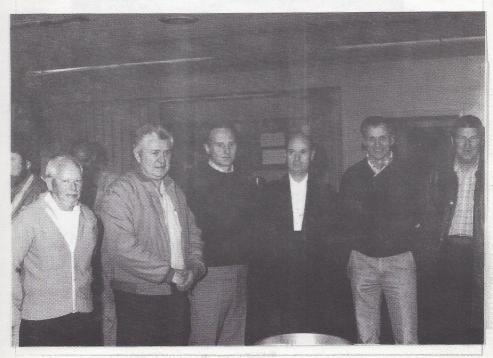

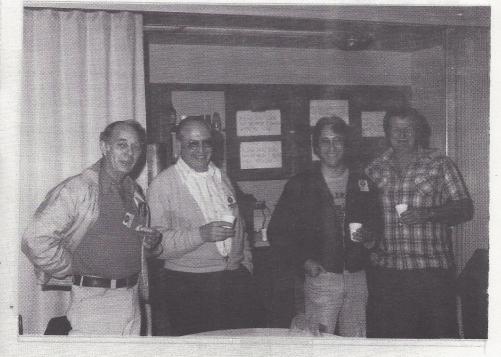

TECHNICAL TIP FOR MARCH

In last months newsletter the "easier and quicker" way to remove an engine from a 1941_1948 Ford was described (from the Ford Service Bulletin I think). That description stated that all front sheet metal should be removed prior to engine removal. If your car has not been apart for forty years this may not be an easy first step.

For those of you who have 1939 Deluxe, 1940 Deluxe, 1940 Standard, 1940-1941 Pickups and 1939-1940 Mercury passenger models, I have good news.

All you need to do is remove the radiator and unbolt the usual engine related fasteners and the engine can be extracted using a modern-day cherry picker. This can be done without removal of the hood or any other sheet metal because of the wide "alligator mouth" opening on these models.
