I was sure the old fellow would never make it to the other side of the road when I struck him.

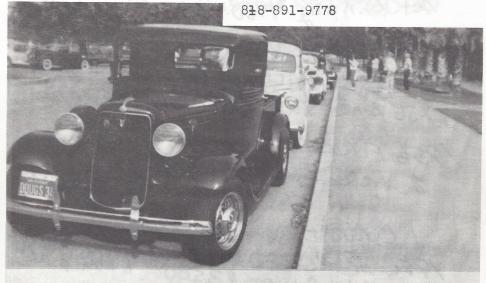
The telephone pole was approaching. I was attempting to swerve out of its way, when it struck my front end.

OLD SAW

"The following Mercury joke, c. 1938-39, was told me by a native Kentuckian who worked in Ford's Sandusky, Ohio plant," writes reader Gary Custer, Harrisonburg, Va.

"Henry Ford and some associates were traveling on a muddy back road in Kentucky in one of the very first Mercury cars. They hung the car up in a particularly bad place, and summoned for a nearby farmer to pull the car out with a team or tractor.

"When the farmer came, he was driving an old Model T. After pulling the Mercury free, he gave the car a good looking-over. He then suggested to the strangers that they get rid of such a car, and buy a Ford. A Ford car wouldn't let you down.

"After returning to Michigan, Mr. Ford sent the farmer a new Ford, and thanked him for his good deed and good advertising.

'The storyteller," adds Custer, "thought this story could have been true."

Could be, at least in part. Variations of this yarn have, in fact, been told and retold for decades. Ford's car is stuck in the mud or ditch. A farmer comes to the rescue. He makes a fuss, but gets the magnate on the road again, and is rewarded with a new car. Or Ford, driving along, runs across a stranded motorist, usually a Model T owner, usually down and out. Henry fixes the car, and sees to it that his new acquaintance gets a new car, and maybe a job offer as well.

Ford without question did give new cars to people on impulse, and also arranged for people to get their vehicles overhauled in Ford facilities. So Custer's native Kentuckian may be on to something; his story

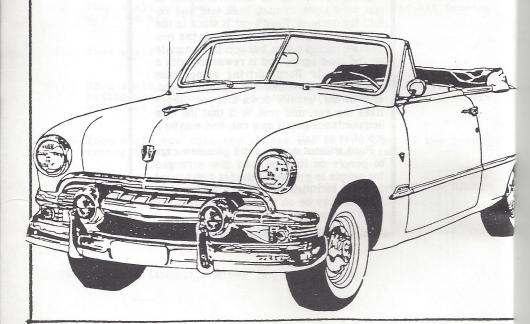
can't be ruled out.

"WHY DO WE DO THAT?"

Henry Ford had an abiding interest in time and quality, and for him the two often meshed.

One day, for example, he passed by a stand where each Ford engine was being tested before being installed in a Model T. "Why do we do that?." he asked his workmen — and himself. The only reason he received was that such testing was standard practice; all auto manufacturers tested every engine before installation.

Ford went straight to his engineers and said, "The only reason we make a trial run of the engine is we are not sure we made it right. Let's make sure of that and stop this testing." After that, each Ford engine came alive in an automobile as it was driven off the final assembly line. Time and money were saved, and engine quality was improved. Ford, as he so often did, pointed a way to inexpensive quality manufacturing.

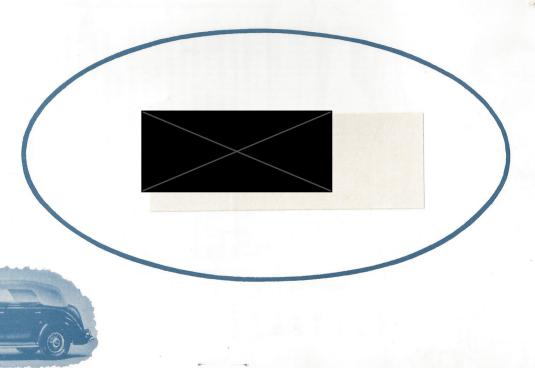
