

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

Automobiles were such a rarity when I was a child that when we saw one coming toward us, as we jogged along behind old Dobbin, my father would get out and hold the horse's head and talk gently to him, as he snorted and was frightened.

"They will never come into general use," my father would say. "Oh, yes, a few hot heads will buy them, will get killed, then they will die out. The drivers will be laughed at like that famous 'Darius Green and his

flying machine.' "

Yet'one of my father's prize possessions was a Model T Ford, and when the Model A came out, he got one and it was his prize

possession also.

The world's first automobile is in a museum in Paris. It is called Cugnot's Steam Carriage and was built in 1769. It was used to pull French artillery in the war. An Englishman named Sir Goldsworthy Gurney built a steam carriage and broke all speed records by driving from Bath, England, to London, and back. He averaged the amazing speed of 15 miles per hour. Because of this, England passed what is called the Red Flag Law. It required a man to walk ahead of such a vehicle and wave a red flag. This law was not repealed until 1896.

The first gasoline propelled automobiles were built in the United States by Frank and Charles Duryea in 1892-'93. The next year, Elwood Haynes of Kokomo, Indiana, had the Apperson brothers

make one which he had designed.

At first only the rich could afford cars. Then, Henry Ford of Michigan used Eli Whitney's idea of making parts and putting them together to invent the assembly line. He demonstrated a Ford could be assembled in 93 minutes. This put cars in a lower price bracket, so middle-class America could afford them.

By 1900, there were 8,000 cars in use in the world. It is said that a farm woman in Kansas was asked why her family owned a car and not a bathtub. She answered, "Why, you can't go to town in a bathtub!"


