

Pat bought the four-door sedan in 1983 and drove it, as is, four years. In 1987 he restored the 40-year-old six-cylinder 95 horsepower three-speed overdrive and then headed for Bend, Oregon and the national Ford owners meeting.

He said the Ford, which has 104,000 original miles on it, gets about 21 miles per gallon on the highway. He values it at

\$5,000.

The car has a Midland Maroon stock paint job, same as the original.

The car will remain on disp ay at Eastern Sierra Motors at 1440 North Highway 6 in Bishop during January.

Henry Ford's Garage Sale Nets \$1.2 Million

Cleaning out Henry Ford's garage took a bit of doing. But after the sale was over, the Henry Ford Museum at Dearborn, Michigan, had over \$1 million in its coffers.

"It was simply time we cleaned out some of our collections," said museum representative David Wojack. "We were running out of room." The space problem originated with Henry Ford himself, who was an avid collector of Americana. During the height of his career, he came to understand the impact of his Model T car on American life and de-

cided he wanted to preserve the things he knew would soon be gone or changed dramatically. Nothing seemed to escape his interest. He collected egg beaters and houses, spinning wheels and cars.

Hundreds of items went up for bid, but the big ticket item from the auction was a 1922 Joswin town car, which went for \$90,000. The car contains an engine made by Mercedes and had a remarkable level of workmanship. "It is a magnificent automobile with brocade interior, gold-plated hardware and inlaid wood," said Randy Mason, a curator at the museum. "The Joswin is of great in-

terest to collectors because so few were made."


Items of not so noble variety were put up for bids as well. "The telephones we had sold like wild," Wojack noted. A 1910 wall phone brought bids that ranged from \$15 to \$1300 and a 1915 locomotive was recorded at having sold for \$3400. Ordinary household items, like vacuum cleaners, went up on the block along with gas street lamps, motorcycles, industrial engines and more. The final \$1 million total came as a surprise to museum heads. "I'd say we were very pleasantly surprised," said Wojack.

The sale was a tribute to Ford's insatiable desire to

preserve the products of American workmanship. That desire was whetted long ago when the inventor and his wife had an argument over a rhyme in a Mc-Guffey reader. To settle the argument, Ford set out to find the rhyme, buying up every McGuffey primer he could find. And so it went until his death. Now the museum carries on the collecting. "We just bought a Volkswagon Beetle for the museum," said Wojack. "Even though it wasn't made in this country, the Volkswagon had a great impact here."

One wonders what Henry Ford would have thought of a VW on his lot?
