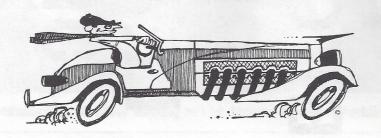
The Saturday Evening Post-THE AUTOMOBILE BOOK (1977)-Written by:Mrs.Scott Carpenter (wife of the astronaut)

WHEN SCOTT DRIVES, he brings his space-capsule thinking to the situation. He never wants to stop, and he never wants to slow down. He wants the car to be as fully controlled as possible. When we bought our last family car - we have four children, so it's a station wagon - he asked Detroit to make so many modifications in the control system that they wired back, "Do you want to drive this car, or launch it?"

One button controls all the windows, in all possible positions. Another can tilt the seats in any of fourteen different ways. The steering wheel can be automatically canted in four different positions, and there is a stereo set with speakers on the right and left, front and back. Air conditioning, two map lights (right and left), tachometer - name it, we got it. And every system has a red warning light which signals if things aren't working properly - and if everything lights up, a drogue chute deploys which brings the car to a dead halt.

We recently moved from Houston, Texas, to Maryland. Scott warned everybody that he was going to drive it nonstop. He started at 5 a.m. and drove steadily for twenty-two hours, with no one spelling him at the wheel. If the children wanted a bathroom stop, they had to make it coincide with a gasoline stop.

I know how he is about trips like that, so I took a plane. When I arrived at our new house, Scott and the children were already there. "What took you so long?" he said. He meant it.

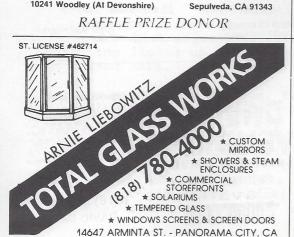
