

LET'S PAINT

It is an undisputable fact that any attempt to refinish the exterior paint of the antique Ford must be done by an experienced individual . . . or a restorer who has made a complete study of the process.

* * * *

It was the year 1934 that Ford V-8 car finishes were changed from lacquer to enamel. Fortunately, some color formulas still exist for the compounding of both types of paint. It is gratifying to the novice painter that he can choose a lacquer finish instead of enamel for his car . . . a much easier handling medium.

There can be no guarantee that a lacquer and an enamel color by the same name will match completely in shade and hue.

Colors after World War II years (DAL and DQE) can be augmented from Ditzler Jobber records. Such jobbers and antique auto stores can also be the suppliers for black lacquer, enamel and engine colors.

Ditzler Color Division files do reveal all code numbers of colors for the early V-8 Ford cars, altho the formulas for some appear to be non-existent (such have been eliminated from color chips of this manual).

The evolution of auto finishes continues to advance, from early carriage inishes in Japans and piano varnish of the Horseless Carriage era that took two weeks to cure and dry, until today, with acrylics that dry nearly on conact into more durable surfaces.

As the acrylic colors become widely used today in auto refinishing, toners (mixing colors) for the antique auto colors have suffered obsolescence with the manufacturer. There has been some assurance that some quantities of these toners will continue to be supplied by special arrangement . . . and possibly some colors re-formulated in acrylic.

To completely cover the interior fabric and refinishing of ten years of Ford built cars would be a gargantuous task. This manual gives what basic information it has available on interior finishes. No small amount of research is left to the restorer from Ford literature such as body parts lists, etc., circa the model year of his car. Wood grain finishing is a task to be left to the expert.

Most antique auto stores and interior refinishing specialists have valuable information concerning the various painting needs . . . they are the ones to contact.

On February 10, 1942, Ford Motor Company halted civilian production of autos and placed the entire effort toward a speedy conclusion of World War II. Cars for civilian use were again in production on July 3, 1945. This accounts for a deletion of years, 1942 through 1945, in this manual.

'Ford: The War Years 1942-1945' traveling exhibit to tour country

"Ford: The War Years 1942-1945," an exhibit featuring photographs, advertisements, and memorabilia from the Ford Motor Co. during the World War II years, 1942-1945, is now on view at the Towe Ford Museum in Sacramento, Calif.

This, the first "traveling" exhibit prepared by the Early Ford V8 Foundation, presents an overview of Ford's involvement in the war effort and major management changes that occurred during that turbulent time.

Ford, along with the other automakers, found themselves out of the auto building business on Feb. 10, 1942, and their entire production focus was on materials and machines for the war effort.

For the Ford Motor Co., these years would also prove to be a turning point in the future of the company following the untimely death of Edsel Ford in 1943. Henry Ford II was released from the service as heir apparent to the Ford empire and assumed chairmanship of the company in 1944.

Beyond these problems, Ford played a vital role in the production of war materials. Using their skills gained producing cars in quantity, Ford engineers were able to build B-24 bombers at the rate of one an hour at the huge Willow Run factory when it was running at full capacity.

Using photographs, magazine advertisements, and memorabilia, "Ford: The War Years 1942-1945" shows the variety of equipment produced from a version of the 1942 car produced as military staff cars to the Ford version of the "General Sherman" tank.

Ford lost out in the original competition to build the popular "jeep" when the Willys company won the government contract. Ironically, Ford became a "partner" with Willys to produce the jeeps in quantity when Willys could not keep up with the demand for the utilitarian vehicles.

The exhibit begins with the attack on Pearl Harbor and ends in late 1945 when Ford received the green light to resume production of the new models for 1946. Actually, these were redesigned 1942 models, but Ford had the distinction of having the first car on the market when car-hungry consumers were ready to buy virtually anything following the war.

"This exhibit presents an important segment of Ford Motor Co. history," says Foundation Chairman Jerry Windle.

Utilizing the medium of a traveling exhibit, the Foundation will be able to present this material in an interesting manner to auto enthusiasts across the country.

"Ford: The War Years 1942-1945" will be on view at the Towe Ford Museum in Sacramento, Calif., through the end of March. Beginning in April, it will be at the Behring Museum in Danville, Calif., through mid-June.

The exhibit then travels cross-country for a special engagement at the 30th Anniversary Grand National Meet of the Early Ford V8 Club of America in Dearborn, Mich., June 29-July 5.

Following the meet, it travels to the Antique Automobile Club of America Library in Hershey, Pa., where it will remain until after the Hershey swap meet. The exhibit is scheduled to be at the National Automobile Museum in Reno, Nev., January-March 1994 and the San Diego Automobile Museum afterwards.

The Early Ford V8 Foundation is a nonprofit, educational organization established in 1992. This traveling exhibit is only a part of the various programs currently underway to preserve this era of Ford Motor Co. history for future generations. 



YOUR OLD FORD IS FLOODED? HERE IS HOW TO START GAS HAS WASHED THE CYLINDERS SO COMPRESSION IS GONE AND THE GAS/AIR MIXTURE WON'T EXPLODE. POUR REGULAR OIL DOWN ABOUT 1/6 QUART OR LESS WILL THE CARBURETOR. COMPRESSION IS RESTORED AND SHE WILL USUALLY START RIGHT AWAY!

CARRY SOME SILICONE ALONG IN YOUR TOOL BOX. SINCE THERE THE COOLING SYSTEM, SILICONE GASKET PRESSURE IN MATERIAL WILL HOLD WELL ENOUGH ON HEADS AND ENGINE TO GET IN THE EVENT OF A CRACKED HEAD OR BLOCK.


