

LET'S PLAY HOOKIE





PAT'S KITCHEN

This month's recipe is one of my favorite sweets.

"Black Forest Brownie Torte"

- package (19.8 oz.) brownie mix, plus ingredients to prepare cakelike version of mix
- 1 can (21 oz.) Comstock Cherry pie filling, divided
- 2-1/2 cups thawed frozen non-dairy whipped topping, divided
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds, toasted at 325 degrees for 6-8 minutes

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour two, 9-inch round cake pans. prepare brownie mix according to directions for cakelike version.

Divide batter evenly between pans. Bake 18 to 20 minutes. Do not over bake. Cool 10 minutes. Remove from pans to wire racks to cool completely.

Place one brownie layer on serving plate. Top with 1-1/2 cups whipped topping, spreading to within 1/2 inch of edge. Spread 1 cup cherry filling evenly over whipped topping.

Top with second brownie layer. Spread remaining cherry filling over the top to within 1/2 inch of the edge. Dollop or pipe remaining 1 cup whipped topping around edge of torte. Sprinkle toasted almonds over the top.

This recipe can be doubled. Use cookie sheet for brownie (one box brownie mix for each cookie sheet). Bake brownie for 8 minutes, turn pan and bake for an additional 8 minutes (16 minutes total), do not over bake.
