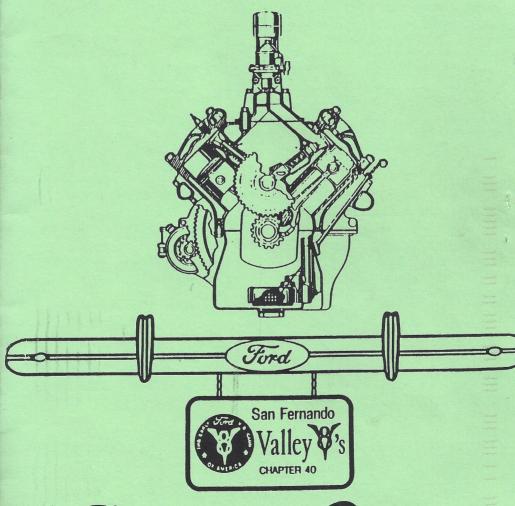

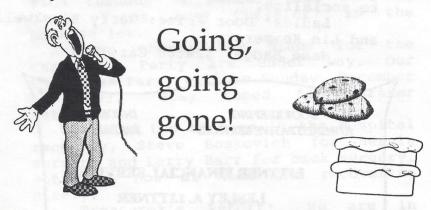

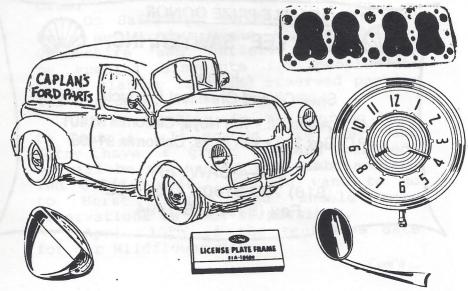

good friend of mine owns a Ford and Lincoln/Mercury dealership. He is a young fellow who inherited the business from his father and grandfather. He called recently to tell me that he had just discovered 300 brandnew '50 Mercurys in a family-owned warehouse in Michigan, and wanted to get rid of them. I was amazed, and asked where they came from. He then told me it was a long story.

His grandfather, Jack Williams, started selling Fords and Lincolns in the mid-'30s just outside of Detroit, Michigan. The dealership was very prosperous and he was good friends with a lot of corporate people at Ford. Along with the car dealership, his grandfather dabbled in real estate and owned buildings in Michigan, including several big

warehouses.

In 1939 Ford introduced the new Mercury, which was a natural for Jack leaving the dealership to his son, who to add to the dealership. Before long, it ran the business from 1952 until a few became one of the largest Lincoln/Mercury dealerships in the country. Things were going great in 1948 when Jack decided to take a vacation to California in the middle of one of Michigan's worst winters. When he got to California the sun was shining, it was 75 degrees and the region was just starting to prosper. Being a shrewd businessman, he could see that California was the land of plenty, and was convinced that the great weather would attract millions of people in the coming years. He realized that a fortune could be made in Southern California.

While on vacation Jack traveled to several areas, looking for a nice chunk of land on which to open up a car dealership. He envisioned a large dealership sprawled over acres of land, unlike the small, compact dealerships in Michigan. Finding a chunk of land for a reasonable price in an area where expansion was just beginning, he went back to Michigan and planned the move to California.

Construction on his new dealership began in 1949. distribute while the strike was going on. He agreed, and gave them the keys. Approximately 400 cars were housed in the warehouse, but the strike never materialized. The executive at Mercury started pulling cars out in small numbers, sending them to dealerships across the country. During this period, the executive had a heart attack and died. The executive who took over his iob came from Ford and didn't know anything about the stored Mercs. Apparently he never found the paperwork on the remaining cars, and the other executives who knew about the cars in the warehouse figured the Mercs had already been sent to dealerships.

Meanwhile, Jack opened the new dealership and sold the one in Michigan. However, he kept all of the other landholdings. He did quite well in California and retired a few years later, years ago, then turned it over to my friend. Last year my friend's dad passed away. Apparently his father still owned all of the landholdings in Michigan, and my friend inherited them. Recently a company that wanted to expand its manufacturing facility approached him about selling one of the warehouses. The offer was good, so he flew back to Michigan to look at the building and make a deal. Walking inside, he found 300 brand-new '50 Mercurys staring him in the face. They were covered with dust, but other than that were perfectly preserved and even had air in the tires. His problem, and the reason he called, was that he had to get rid of the old cars because the building was going through escrow. He contacted Ford about the Mercs and they didn't want to have anything to do with them. My friend said he would sell all of the cars for sticker price, which ranged from \$1500 to \$2000, depending on how they were equipped. I told him I'd take a convertible, and said that there might be a few other people who would be interested.

SELECTION AND TRAINING OF SERVICE PERSONNEL

In the following paragraphs a detailed description is given for the selection and training of service personnel for different types of work within the service department. The background of knowledge and the experience required for the personnel for each type of work is discussed. The publications which outline the procedures and instructions to be followed for training, testing, and repairing, are likewise given.

Pride in craftsmanship must be instilled in each mechanic. However, mechanics having this pride in their work will find it difficult to retain it if they are forced to work in a dirty, poorly maintained shop. Good craftsmen can only be obtained or retained if good working conditions exist. Good working conditions include:

(a) ADEQUATE VENTILATION, LIGHTING, AND HEAT-ING. Men cannot do good work under the following conditions: Exhaust fumes due to lack of proper ventilation, lack of sufficient heat, and improper lighting.

(b) PROMPT SERVICE AT THE PARTS DEPARTMENT. Men who work on contract resent any time lost at the parts window (fig. 1). Many larger Dealers employ

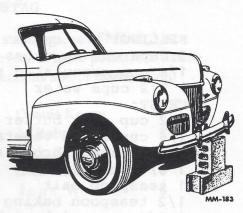


Figure 2—Improvisations Are Costly

parts hustlers to get the parts for the mechanics. Mechanics resent being unable to do first-class work because of any failure by the parts department to maintain a supply of needed parts.

(c) ADEQUATE GENERAL PURPOSE SHOP EQUIP-MENT. Lack of adequate shop equipment makes it con-

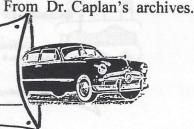
stantly necessary for the mechanic to improvise (fig. 2). This lowers the individual's productivity and results in poor workmanship.

(d) CLEANLINESS. Provide an adequate supply of clean seat and fender covers, adequate towels and wiping cloths. Provide clean, adequate, and well-kept

wash room facilities. Your mechanics can't feel or act like craftsmen if they must carry each day's accumulation of dirt on their persons until they get home. Maintain a clean and orderly shop (fig. 3). Don't expect craftsmen to do janitor work.

DATE BARS

FILLING:

3 cups cut up dates (1 pound)

1/4 cup granulated sugar

1 1/2 cups water

CRUST:

1/2 cup soft butter or margarine

1/4 cup solid vegetable shortening

1 cup packed brown sugar

1 3/4 cup flour

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 1/2 cup quick cooking oats

For filling, in a saucepan, mix dates, granulated sugar and water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, about 10 minutes, until thickened. Cool.

For crust, in a bowl, cream butter, shortening and brown sugar. Mix in flour, salt, baking soda and oats.

Grease a 13X9 inch pan. Press half of crust mixture evenly in bottom of pan. Spread with filling. Top with remaining crust mixture, pressing lightly.

Bake in a preheated 400° oven 25 to 30 minutes or until lightly brown. While warm, cut into bars. Makes 3

dozen bars.

Dear Regional Group President,

The following is an article copied from *Old Cars Weekly*, March 4, 1999 issue, which is of utmost importance to our club cars.

NEW BILL WILL CLOSE SMOG-LAW LOOPHOLE

Sen. Richard Mountjoy (R-Arcadia) has introduced a bill SB 285 - which will be heard by the Senate Transportation Committee this spring - to exempt old cars from biennial smog checks. A previous law SB 42 (Kopp) exempted pre-1974 vehicles, but didn't cover checks made with remote-sensing devices. An older vehicle triggering a remote-sensing device can still be required to undergo a smog test.

"I am appalled that hidden traps on the side of the road can snare older cars not required to have smog checks, pulling them into the test as a spider taps a fly in its web," Sen. Mountjoy stated. "There is a loophole in the law which will allow bureaucrats to trap exempted older cars, like classics. People assumed that cars older than 1974 were really exempt as the law says. I am appalled that the bureaucrats, who did not want older cars to be exempt, will be able to keep them under their thumbs because of a hidden loophole in the law."

Today I called the office of Senator Mountjoy, and was advised that in addition to letters of support to him, we should send copies to the Senate Transportation Committee members. In approximately two weeks these members will be announced, and I will pass their names on to you.

I urge you to give your support to SB 285, and have enclosed a suggested letter for your consideration, to be used by individuals or collectively by your R.G..
