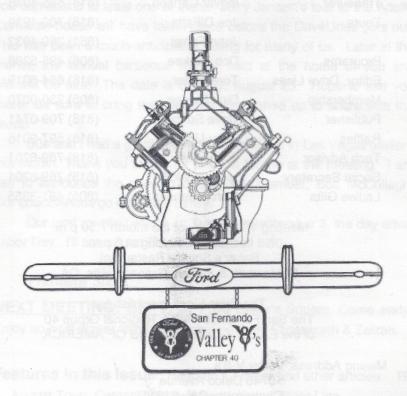

#### **August Tour: Camarillo Mansion and Airport Flight Line**

On the 17 <sup>th</sup> we gathered at Jerry Jensen's place for coffee and donuts. Jerry's latest project was available for viewing in the back garage. Not surprisingly, it is a <u>'39 convertible sedan</u>. When I saw it last, it was a bent and rusted hulk. Now, the body which is straight and mounted on the frame was looking great. Very impressive work! See the picture on P.12. Jerry's Tudor, the convertible coupe (see Park City article) and his beautifully finished convertible sedan were available for viewing. They are all '39s and immaculate. Let's not overlook Jerry and Carole's home either. Carole has done an incredible job on every room and this was all open for us to admire.

We departed for the Adolfo Camarillo Mansion and fifteen minutes later all 20 of our cars were parked on the curving drive in front of the 1892 Mansion. Some of our V-8s parked beneath the second largest Moreton Bay fig tree in California which is over 100 years old.

As we approached the stately front entrance, Jerry introduced us to Gary Blum, the Manager of the Camarillo Ranch and our docents dressed in period costumes. As we were led through the newly restored three story Victorian, one could imagine the nine Camarillos, Adolfo, Isabella and their seven children, living a life of disciplined grace in the bright, well furnished rooms. We were actually looking at the home as it was in its remodeled condition that dates to 1914. So there was a craftsman look to many of the interiors

Clearly, Adolfo didn't put up with anything that he didn't like. The children only came down stairs after they were dressed for dinner. He insisted that only Spanish was spoken at the table though Adolfo wrote in his extensive personal diary only in English with a distinctive hand. He was a forward looking man who was always interested in a better way of life. As weather and economics changed, he changed his 10,000 acre spread from Mexican style cattle ranching, to citrus, fruit and nut orchards. As he replaced his horse drawn equipment with gasoline powered trucks and tractors (possibly Fords?) he changed again to mechanized truck farming all the while aware of its

profitability.

Adolfo was a true horseman who bred many beautiful animals not the least of which was the Camarillo White Horse. There was a Morgan, Arabian, Spanish crossbreed descending from one of his stallions, "Sultan." He and his family were proud to be seen on his White Horses in the Pasadena Rose Parade, the Santa Barbara Fiesta, and many other venues. It is believed that his daughter, Carmen Camarillo Jones, rode a Camarillo White 50 times in Santa Barbara parades.

Adolfo made many gifts of land. In 1898 he helped bring the Southern Pacific Railroad to town with a land grant. He and his brother Juan donated land to build St. Mary Magdalen Chapel in 1914, and St. John's Seminary in 1930. He also donated land to the State of California to build Hwy 101 from Camarillo to the top of Conejo Grade. He had earlier planted part of this route with over 100 eucalyptus trees, some of which remain to this day. He was a 57-year member of the Pleasant Valley School Board (1894-1951) and donated the land needed to build Camarillo High School, named in his honor.

Overriding the objections of Adolfo and his brother Juan, the Southern Pacific Railroad named the town and its station Camarillo. For his civic work and his generosity, he was named a Knight of St. Gregory by Pope Pius XII in 1950. Adolfo, who was often called "The Last Spanish Don," died December 10, 1958 and is buried beside his wife in the Camarillo Family Crypt at the St. Magdalen Chapel he had helped to establish 44 years earlier. Thus ends the story of an amazing man and his legacy.

Our tour continued from the Mansion to the Camarillo Airport and not just the parking lot, but the flight line itself surrounded by Cessnas, Pipers and Beachcraft Bonanzas. The Way Point Café served a good lunch as we sat around tables and talked with our V-8 friends.

Thanks Jerry, for your work in putting together one of the best attended tours of the year. We have not only learned much about our local history, but located a significant new attraction to which we can invite out-of-town guests and other V-8ers.

**Tech Talk** Are your lights low? Here are some ideas from Ingvar.

Check for voltage drop where contacts or terminals may be rusted or corroded. Using a volt meter: 1.) Check /clean the battery contacts, especially the + ground 2). Measure voltage in and out of the headlight switch. 3) Check output of high beam foot switch.4.) You may want to install halogen bulbs to reduce carrot dependency forever! 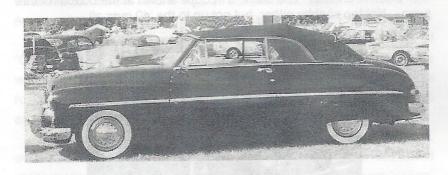

Right up to the end, Bob still maintained his love for old cars, even if it meant reading Hemmings with a magnifying glass. We talked at least once a month and I tried to fill him in on all the recent "scoop" to keep him informed. I'll miss him.
