

spent a bit too much money on things they just had to have and that were priced just right. There were a series of drawings and Virginia Wolf won a bottle of wine... (She told us the party





After all, our name is "Valley V8s." It doesn't say "Ford V8s."




Signs galore out of the 40's and 50's.


CAR OF THE MONTH




lines, wiring, etc. You have all been there and done that.
