


## "Beauty, Comfort and Safety: The Story of the 1935 Ford" Our Club Members Shine in a Major Article in Collectible Automobile

What do Dave Sanborn and Ron & Ann Marie Batesole have in common? '35 Fords, of course. But there is more, much more! In the February 2003 issue of Collectible Automobile, their cars are featured on 11 glossy pages in a descriptive article on the '35 Ford. The photos display some of the most thoroughly restored '35s out there. The glossy 9 x 11 publication (\$7.95 each or \$39.95 / year) includes no less than 30 contemporary full color photos of 13 restored '35 Fords. In addition, there are four black & white archival photos and a full-page 1935 Ford ad featuring a yellow three window. The layout and content of the article are pure quality.

Ten of the 29 color photos show our members' cars. The pictures of Ron's five window coupe include a front and a rear shot, an engine view and one of the dash. Ron's blue-gray beauty is also pictured on page one in the "Calendar of Events" to tease

readers into probing the contents of the publication.

Dave's touring Tudor rated a front and a rear view and two beautiful close ups of the dash, radio included. A front photo of Dave's convertible sedan in a park setting measures 5 x 7. Clearly the author, Paul McLaughlin, holds the photos of these particular cars in high esteem. This is a real complement to Dave and Ron and the hard work of restoring and maintaining these true "Collectables."

The article describes many features of the 1935 Ford. It was the year that Ford came from behind to out-sell the General Motors low priced car by 271,000 units. This was the first year of a dramatically new body design and "Center Poise Ride." That means the front spring was moved ahead of the axle and lengthened. The engine was moved forward over 8 inches which allowed the seats to move forward by the same amount so the rear seat was now ahead of the axle. Ford added a convertible sedan for the first time since the Model A days and the '35 woody came with front hinged doors and roll up windows. The Victoria was replaced by a Touring Tudor and a Touring Fordor which had

a built in trunk accessed from a small door in its top. (High lifting

exercises anyone?)

## Did you get to the Greater LA Auto Show?

The exhibits closed on Jan.12, so in case you didn't get to this showcase of the latest, here are some of the highlights with emphasis on Ford V-8s.

What's new in the coming year from Ford you ask? One of the more exciting vehicles is the 2004 F 150 pick up. Pictured here is a yellow extended cab and a black crew cab. They are completely restyled with a longer cab and easier access to all seats. A new torsion resistant frame, heavier rear springs, 17 inch wheels and an increased towing capacity which accompany an improved engine / transmission combination are featured. Included among the power train options are the Triton 5.4 L V-8 SOHC with three valves / cylinder generating 300 hp and 365 ft-lb of torque.

We saw a T-bird with a supercharged 3.9 L V-8 which will not be available for a year of two in production cars. Meanwhile, the 280 hp version of this classy two seater is available in the \$42,000 range. Wendi's choice of Thunderbirds (page 14) is baby blue with color keyed interior and a hard top complete with retro porthole. Now, where do I find the 42K?

The Lincoln LS V-8s, have some significant improvements for '03 including 28 more horses (now 280 up from 252). a redesigned front console, a flip down moving map guidance system and an electronic parking brake. Wendi's favorite color in this model is still "New Parchment."

New for '03 is the Lincoln Aviator with a 4.6 L 302 hp V-8. The basic dimensions are those of an Explorer but in reality, very few body panels or mechanicals are interchangeable. The Aviator offers the comfort of a serious entry-level luxury sedan including new suspension, a touch screen navigation system with map display and voice command capability and a rear DVD screen. Yet it has the versatility and seven passenger spaciousness of a mid sized SUV for "those who travel well" as Lincoln likes to put it.

If you want he ultimate in German luxury and you have a spare \$300,000, your car is the Maybach 57 (5.7 meters long). It is equipped with the Mercedes V-12 which they claim allows the huge car to accelerate 0 - 60 in 5.2 seconds. This is a four passenger four door sedan (with 90 degree door openings) in

which each side of the rear seat features its own video screen with independent wireless headsets and rear seats that recline. These are not cars that you buy from dealer inventory. Each is contracted through a dealer and built to order to the specifications of each buyer. The quantities are limited and we understand that this year's production is sold out already.

We learned about the Hummer during the Gulf War. We learned about the Mini-Cooper from the British in the '60s. Today, we are witness to a what seems to be a cross between the two. Some people say that when these two got together the results were a Honda Element. It is, well, hard to take seriously. Honda, themselves call it a cross between a dorm room and a base camp. Anyway, it is in production in East Liberty, Ohio. The two tone paint job itself is an attention getter. To see a Hummer-like Mini or a Mini-like Hummer see page 10. At the other end of this line is the very sensible Honda Civic. It is totally a sound and well built Civic (which other cars of this type are not) but the one we saw was a Hybrid. It has a little gas engine (1.3 L) and an electric motor / generator to boost power as needed. I saw a window sticker on the car that said it got 58 mpg in town and 57 on the highway. Say what?



Some are incredibly beautiful, some are complex beyond understanding while others are ugly as sin and appeal to an very narrow market segment. Will they become a production reality? No one knows. ## Scott Doudrick's Talk at the January Meeting Focuses on JPL and the Exploration of Mars

Our January Meeting Presentation was the prep session for our tour to JPL. Scott's talk was about Mars exploration and the 2003 Mars Exploration Rover (MER) Project on which Scott is the Cruise Phase Technical Lead. The idea was to give our members background information prior to the January tour to JPL where the rovers are being built and tested. Both rovers will launch from Cape Kennedy, one at the end of May and one at the end of June.

The vehicles have evolved from Mars Pathfinder which, we all recall, was a focus of national attention when it landed on Mars July 4, 1997. The new vehicles being prepared for the 2003 launch are much larger and more capable than Pathfinder. For example, Pathfinder's Sojourner rover weighed 10 kg. or about 23 lbs. Each new Mars Exploration Rover weighs over 170 kg. (375 lbs.). While Pathfinder was able to drive about 100 ft, total with one instrument, each new MER will be able to drive more than the length of a football field across the surface of Mars with six instruments and many more experiments! If all goes well, the results will be transmitted back to earth for careful analysis. This is a very exciting and challenging project which should be showing us new views of Mars, just after we land next January!

What we learn about Mars helps us in many untold ways to understand our planet and the solar system of which we are a part. Thanks, Scott, for the great program and for this close-up of new and developing science at its best. TP

## Car of the Month, Don Durkee's '53 Convertible

This black beauty started life in Richmond, CA in 1953. Its owner moved to Portland, Oregon where the car stayed until the late '70s. It was sold and moved back to California in the hands of Jerry Little, the second owner, who continued the great care given by the original owner. Then Jack Pankey took ownership in San Leandro in '83. By the way, did you know that San Leandro is where the Early Ford V-8 Club of America got its start?


Anyway, Jack reupholstered the front seat and installed its current black top with red piping. Jack also installed all the accessories that were available through Ford in 1953 except a Continental or a Coronado kit. Don first saw this spotless convertible in 1985 when it won a Dearborn at the Western Nationals in Ventura.

In 1991 Art Bjornestad bought it continuing the excellent care it had always received. Don says that every time he saw Art driving the car he wished it was his. A few years later a minor accident caused Art to bring the car to Don's for repairs. The grill and front right fender were replaced. Otherwise, it is an original car. Now, Don had to drive Art home and bring the car back to his place.

Don had been in love with the black convertible from a distance. Now, driving it, his dream was coming true. This was a chance to be up close to the car he had always wanted. "It drove even better than it looked!" says Don. It was impossible to say "No!" He had to have her. He told Art to keep the insurance check and he would pay the difference up to the price Art wanted. As is often the case, love is a very expensive proposition. He scraped together the money and brought the convertible home. He paid more for that car than any he ever bought including his modern ones.

The car has never been restored, just very well kept. It has power brakes and steering. You may know that '53 was the first year that Ford and Mercury offered these as a factory options. This great car represents the last year Ford put the flathead V-8 in American automobiles. It is truly something a guy could be proud to drive. Perhaps Don would say that for the last five years he has been in "car heaven." And for the lowa Farm Boy (and the rest of us too), that's a good thing! DD

Don Durkee's '53 Ford Convertible Car of the Month
