

January Tour, JPL / NASA At Its Best

The day dawned bright and clear, Eight flathead V8's and numerous modern cars rolled from Woodly Park at 8:15 sharp on their way to JPL. The traffic was light and the rolling hills and green mountains along the 210 Fwy led us onward. Other cars from the Ventura group and other V8'ers from the Valley joined us at the JPL facility below the green San Gabriel Mountains to start our well-organized tour.

After a brief orientation, we entered the Von Karman Museum of Space Travel. The displays and a movie on the history of planetary exploration were winners. While some of the information was over our heads, most of what we heard and saw was very understandable and drew us into the excitement of

practical science at its cutting edge.

The videos and the displays of the Solar System were dramatic and very informative. The Museum helped us get oriented for the tour of the Lab to follow.

We were then divided into three groups and under the leadership of our well-informed guides, all JPL employees, proceeded to the three locations where "the real work is accomplished." At the Mars Exploration Rover (MER) assembly test and launch operation, we viewed from an over head gallery, actual components being assembled in a huge "clean room" where many tests were in progress. We saw instruments that will be going into space in May and again in June such as a periscope like camera, which was being put through its paces as we watched.

Our next stop was at the MER test beds where exploration Rovers are given a practical work out. The large room is a "Martian landscape" but without as much dust as will actually be found on red planet. Rovers are programmed to drive around larger rocks (turning radius ~ 4 ft) and over small ones. They are simply told to go from "A" Since it takes to "B". several minutes, at the speed of light, to send and receive commands from Earth, the rovers must be pre-programmed to make "drive around" decisions on their own. One of our party, Joey Nitz, Leon Nitz' grandson, was asked to lie down "on Mars" as a small

model Rover climbed over his body and successfully navigated the "obstacle." By the way, this particular 11 year old was one of

having the vehicle drive over him, "Not good." We are happy to report that his health is still sound. No bone crushing was reported.

Another stop was the Space Fight Operations Center, which is being renovated for the launch. The Mars bound rover will actually be controlled from here once launch from Cape Canaveral is successful. We often see the Houston Control Center in action on TV. But "Pasadena", which looks similar, is right here in the neighborhood! It just doesn't sound right though. Can you hear Tom Hanks as Jim Lovell saying, "Pasadena, we've had a problem!"? Well, this is unmanned space travel so were not going to hear that one.



far greater understanding of our interplanetary space program. The JPL location has, in many ways, the feeling of a college campus complete with large buildings and all the labs and offices to house a staff of over 5,000 scientists and support personnel. Of course, what we learn in space has countless applications here on Earth. JPL gives us a chance to turn dreams of practical unmanned space travel into reality. I'm sure it's a pressure cooker, but what a fun one! TP

were over 50 cars present from all over Southern California. Some were for sale, which included a completely restored woody for which \$100,000 was turned down. There were "basket cases" that you may have been able to buy for \$2500 if you were desperate.

The sale and swap meet offered buyers a wide variety of flathead Ford parts, new and not so new for V-8s. Our members were selling and seemed to be doing well in moving the usual and unusual items they offered. Included in the meet was a complete dashboard gage set for a '46 Super Deluxe, Ford Script tool kits in good and not so good condition and, as Wendi says, "some unidentifiable rusty pieces of semething."

Nick Alexander treats us all very well indeed. His dealership allows us to use albut the show room for this annual activity, which included a deligious BBQ and a trip in a van to his restoration facilities. now consists of two separate buildings both large enough for several cars. One building is dedicated to wood restoration and the other to mechanical work. The wood restoration side was by far the most unique. His employees showed us where they had doweled and wood-grained holes in doors, where they had painstakingly used lacquer thinner and putty knives to separate the plies from panels in order to reuse the wood. It was amazing the skill and care these people brought to their jobs!

This event was a time for socializing, including car talk with friends some of whom we had not seen since last year's event. Naturally, there is always a chance to meet new V-8ers and talk about their cars and interests.

Meeting in this relaxed atmosphere with club members is fun. There is time to hear the new stories about V-8s and listen to how the old stories have changed since we heard them last. We do have more time and less pressure, which makes the pleasant atmosphere more enjoyable.

We owe a big thanks to Nick and his competent staff for the opportunity to get together and enjoy his fabulous collection of completely restored Woody's. It includes almost every year of Ford and Mercury woody, from 1932 through 1951, the last year woodies (with wood not wood graining on metal) were made by Ford. Of special note were the presence of Sportsman convertibles, those rare and very valuable status symbols that were top of the line cars fifty five years ago, and they still sell for far more than other cars in their time frame except, of course, the beautiful Chrysler Town and Countrys of the same period

It is fun to drive home from such an event and enjoy the focus on so many cars and people who share your interests and the values that make this hobby so enjoyable.

Scott Doudrick shared that tours of JPL will cease soon because they are intensifying their preparation for the May and the June launches of Mars Exploration Rovers. 
Regarding out February 1st visit to Nick Alexander's, Blacky told us that Nick has perhaps, the biggest and best collection of woodies anywhere in the world. He offered that Ron Thorn, a Utah V-8 collector, said that though he had many woodies, no one had as fine a collection as Nick. Early Ford activity is on the increase as is car collecting generally according to Larry Caplan.

He recalled that when he first started going to the Turlock Fairgrounds for car shows, you could drive up to the gate and simply walk to the show from the street. Now, he says, that the same meet is attracting so many people, that you have to walk a very long way to get from your parked car to the fairgrounds entrance.

Our February Program had two parts. The first was Mary Durkee's hands-on demonstration of how to make a quilt in less

than two hours without sewing. She brought in a quilt that was partly completed. First the material is folded in half. Then you cut a "Post-it" (3" X 3") sized square from each corner. Then cut into

all sides about three inches making halfinch wide strips. You end up with strips ("fringe") that you use to tie the two halves together. Her sample. beautiful blue material with a car and plane print design, was given to the club to be auctioned off at our May meeting. That one will bring a high



price! Interesting way to make a "keep-warm-in-winter" blanket and a generous gift to the club. Thank you Mary!

Since Valentine's Day is upon us as we write this, it seemed fitting that the next part of the program was Allan Franklin's display of Valentines showing what was available during the Model T era to send to a loved one. His and Elaine's collection are framed for safe keeping to minimize aging. This is a better idea than the old shoebox for all of us who wish to preserve those cherished cards from the past. Hey! Joe and Marsha have been together for 42 years! Maybe they have some old cards that could be framed!

Then Allan showed us an old device for setting up Early Ford V-8 distributors. This simple plate-like device accommodates distributors with two or three mounting screws. Since the tool came with no literature or a name of the manufacturer, Allan would like to hear from anyone who knows anything about it. He can see the letters N T-6D stamped on the plate. Interesting and fun to collect samples of old tools.
