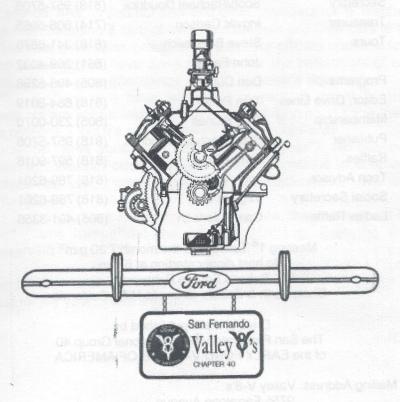
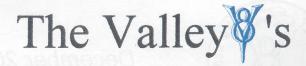

How do we get to the holiday party???? A map and Directions

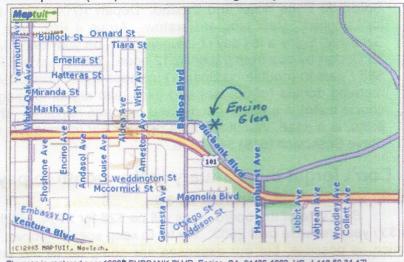

It generated enough electricity to light the streets and the Capitol at Sacramento 20 miles away. The four huge turbine driven generators we saw, were on line until 1952 having served

the same function for almost 60 years. Two smaller turbines were

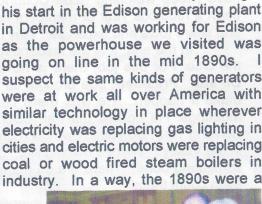

It was the holidays, 1893. Clara had given birth to Edsel just six weeks earlier on November 6th. The Ford's had moved into their new Bagley Avenue home two weeks prior to Christmas. It was an exciting time for the young Mrs. Ford, because her family was coming to Greenfield for a big holiday celebration.

Clara was busily preparing a special meal for the next day, while Edsel slept quietly in the next room. In comes Henry, charging through the kitchen door, carrying the gasoline engine he had been diligently working on. He cleared the counter, clamped the motor to her drain board and asked his good wife to help him "fire it up".

To Henry's excitement, it did "fire right up". No comment on the level of delight Clara must have felt, but this was probably not in her game plan for Christmas Eve.

This success was one of many for Henry and one of the many times Clara would support her husband, regardless of the inconvenience. As a matter of fact, Clara was often saying to others, "Henry is making something, and maybe someday..."

November Meeting Program by Tom Sparks



President Joe thanks our November speaker, Tom Sparks

Tom's hot rodding time runs from 1942 to 1958. It was an exciting time for him and the beginning of a movement that was to last for well over 50 years. Much of it was related mainly to the Flathead Ford V-8. Hot

rodding was looked at differently back then. Many

thought that kids were giving the sport a bad name. They tried to out-run the police just for fun, which was "one of many risky things I did during my early years. Looking back, I see how crazy it was," says Tom.

One of the times he got caught, he hit a fire-plug and while water washed down everything at the accident site, the police hauled him away. Another time, he was on his way to Carl Orr's Speed shop near Sepulveda and the police started following him. Tom tried to loose them. He got trapped in a dead end street so he pulled into an open garage and shut the door behind him. Some kids, playing in the street, pointed to the closed door when the police arrived and again, (guess what?) he was hauled away. It seemed the police were always following hot rods trying to find a way to bust them and that included Tom's rod. There were many incidents and these two were just examples.

There was a period in his life in which he raced all the time, but though it was very exciting, he couldn't pay his bills. He got a job as a mechanic at Eddie Myers' Speed Shop. Later, in 1952, he opened his own shop and sponsored such drivers as Johnny Parsons and Billy Garrett. Rods became less popular by 1955 so Tom changed his business emphasis to working on sports cars until the mid '60s.

At this point, he changed again, this time to restoration and repair of antique and classic cars. He continued in that line of work until 1998 when he retired. The restoration business was tough because you had to build a reputation. But one well-known car, "done right," can get the business going.

He worked on the film "Tucker", a Coppola / Lucas production. He wanted to work in Los Angeles, rather than in the San Francisco are since all his equipment was all down here.

After a while he was hired in Los Angeles. The job was to build five mainly fiberglass replicas so that no real Tucker would get damaged in the accident scenes in the movie. He enlisted the help of numerous Tucker owners to assist him with making the patterns and the look of the cars. It is unclear how many of these replicas survive today, since they were supposed to be destroyed after the filming. Somehow, though, a few seemed to end up on Lucas' ranch. Strange things happen in the movie business!

Thanks Tom, for sharing a piece of Early Ford and Tucker history from personal experience. And a special thanks to Don Durkee, our super program director, for bringing us Tom Sparks.

It started in 1969 when I married Elaine and we settled down in Hancock Park. In 1971 we joined the MTFCA and I decided to buy a Model T Ford just like the one I used to own in high school. While looking for ads in the LA Times I spotted an ad for a

1923 Franklin Demi-sedan. We went to see it and bought it on the spot. I was the only one in the T club driving a Franklin on all their tours. We even drove to San Diego and Catalina. Many of the members also had other cars. Some were Model A's or Early V-8's. My Model T friends, Don Dupree, Ron Batesole and Gene Wilson all had V-8's and if I wanted to drive on the freeways, I would need to get a V-8. It didn't take long before I found my

1935 Ford coupe at the Rose Bowl Swap Meet in 1976. I joined the Valley V-8's that year. The coupe needed a few things and with the help of my gang: Dupree, Wilson and my 2 year old son Eric, we had it running really fine in no time.



In 1983 I needed money to buy a new printing press for my company so I decided to sell the Ford coupe. I took it back to the Rose Bowl and found a buyer. Then four

Allan's '35 at a Warner Brothers Lot years later, a strange thing happened. The man I sold the coupe to had died. His wife had kept my phone number and called to say that she was selling the car and did I want to bid on it? I went over to see it thinking it wouldn't hurt just to look. The car had been sitting for over a year and would not start. I decided to help her get it running so I loaned her a battery charger and I replaced the coil. At least she would be able to get top dollar for it now. She asked if I was going to bid on the car. I was embarrassed and did not know how to say "no!" I placed a low bid in a sealed envelope and gave it to her. A week later she called to say I was the high bidder. I got the money somehow and bought the car back.
