

PROGRAM FOR THE JAUNARY MEETING



Ron Cunningham will be our speaker at the January Meeting. This fascinating man will share the "unclassified" highlights of his career in defense intelligence. Ron has had two full careers, the first for 24 years as an Air Force officer in R&D assignments, and the

second for 22 years at R&D Associates.

His research in the Air Force covered corrosion prevention in jet engines. At the Defense Atomic Support Agency, he worked closely with Los Alamos, Livermore and Sandia Labs on nuclear weapon design. He was a consultant to the Joint Chiefs of Staff during the Cuban Missile Crisis and wrote a comparison of the US and Soviet weapons programs.

At the Defense Intelligence Agency, he worked closely with CIA, NSA and on National Intelligence Estimates of foreign missile and weapons programs. He has also worked with the DIA Scientific Intelligence Advisory Committee and the President's Foreign Intelligence Board.

At Air Force Systems Command he was head of the Weapons Division, He was one of two Colonels who developed a new program for High Energy Laser Weapons. His last Air Force assignment was as Commander and Director of the Air Force Weapons Laboratory in Albuquerque, NM. During his three years there, the first high-energy laser was installed in an aircraft, which then shot down air-to-air missiles. The first combat use of the Daisy Cutter was in Afghanistan.

Leaving the Air Force, he joined R&D Associates, an offshoot of RAND Corporation, and conducted research on military crews under extreme stress.

We look forward to hearing Ron. Because of the nature of this presentation, we are expecting that the program may run a little longer than usual at our January meeting. THIS IS A DO NOT MISS MEETING! TP

We all, that is, about 85



My Second '50 Ford Coupe

Fast forward to the Spring of 1989. I was still working for Kemp Ford when I received a strange call. "How much are you gonna give me for the coupe?"

what coupe you are talking about."

The reply was, "You know, the maroon coupe you were looking at over here a while back. This is Rudy. What are you going to give me for the coupe? It is for sale."

I asked him. "How much?" He said, "You tell me!"

I said, "It has been ten years since I saw that car!" He was very pushy about me giving him a price. He said it was the same as when I saw it. I offered him \$5000. He told me that I should know it was worth \$10,000, but he also said I should come over and look at it when I got off work Wednesday night.

I rushed over to his place to see the car. I found that there was ten years of dust on the car and a dent in the front door and fender because they were too close together. Every time you opened the door, it would hit the fender. The chrome on the bumpers had green corrosion from sitting in that horse barn.
