





question, bo you love me? questioning their own new relationship, but from middle aged people who have been married for 25 years! What is the answer the play gives us? "I suppose I love you." I wonder how many of us have asked that question of ourselves as we look at our own mature lives.



Wild Fire Management



The outstanding speaker at the July meeting is the father of our very own Scott Doudrick, who while on vacation in California, agreed to join us for the evening and give us a presentation based on his life work, Forest Management and Fire Prevention. From his home in St Paul, MN, where he is an

assistant director in the North Central Forest Research Center, Rob brought along an outstanding series of slides, many on fires in Southern California. These were scanned into Scott's PowerPoint program on his computer for us to see while Rob presented for 30 information packed-minutes.



A central theme in the program was the danger and challenge of managing forests in and around urban areas. The area of greatest challenge is called Wildland-Urban Interface. The devastating fires of the 2003 season in California were prime examples of what can happen when an urban

population moves into a forested area with inadequate planning / management / maintenance for fire fighting and prevention. Key to all of this, of course, is adequate funding, a serious factor at all levels of California government these days.

In some cases, county and city planning departments make inadequate provision for fire access roads and brush clearance. Building materials such as wood shake / wood shingle roofs do not adequately take into account the possibility of severe drought and forest fire. Nor do they take into account the flooding and mud slide dangers that follow a big burn. Deaths mounted significantly last winter from this cause in the San Gabriel Mountains following the big burns of the preceding summer.

Even when planning is adequate, management requires vigilance by property owners, Rob said. Continued development,

when under pressure by developers, sometimes defeats the best intentions of the original plan. Resident property maintenance is vital to successful fire fighting. Brush clearance and tree clearing are key to minimizing losses.

Rob discussed three types of fires, all of which were present in Southern California last season. Ground fires are the least dangerous, but have the potential to explode. This happens when there are large accumulations of highly combustible material. The result can develop into a ladder or a crowning fire.

Ladder fires occur when ground fires work their way up standing trees that have not been trimmed or thinned, particularly tall standing timber near residential areas. Trimming and thinning is a vital part of forest fire prevention.

Crown fires are usually the result of fires in the tops of trees, blown by high winds which travel from tree to tree 20 - 50 feet above ground. These are the most dangerous and fastest spreading fires in our forests. Particularly when there are many diseased and dead trees in the forest, crown fires can move with amazing speed trapping residents and fire fighters alike.

In some Southern California areas, such as the forest around Lake Arrowhead, up to 50% of the standing timber is dead or dving as a result of the Mountain Pine Beetle. Under these conditions, disastrous fires are a constant danger. It is a matter of "when" not "if" the fires will occur.

Modern fire fighting techniques include the extensive use of backfires. Since large fires often create their own weather, the updraft winds of large fires suck burning material toward the fires, thus making backfiring one of the best ways to clear the ground around a fire. Though roads and fire breaks are often helpful as lines of defense, in high wind conditions, burning embers can make fires jump 1/4 to 1/2 mile, making the break ineffective.

Residents can help by creating at least 30 feet of fuel-free ground around their homes. Regular irrigation and trimming can make a difference. Filled pools and available fueled-up gasoline powered water pumps can sometimes mean saving a structure.

While all of these precautions are usually known, it is often an alert, concerned public that is willing to invest in an adequate amount of fire fighters and equipment that makes the difference between success and failure when the fire season is upon us. Thank you, Rob Doudrick, for your fascinating presentation and thank you, Scott, for helping us to obtain a fine program! TP

Last Tour. Irv Warren

Irv Warren passed away last month at the age of 70. He was born in Buffalo, New York, in October 1934. He was a cabinetmaker and his main business was building and remodeling the interior of jewelry stores, which he did for many years in Los Angeles. He sold his business years ago and retired to what he wanted to do most, work on Early Ford V-8s.

Joe Longobardi met Irv Warren about 35 years ago. Joe remembers Irv pushing a Ralph's shopping cart through one swap meet after another looking for Ford parts. But there was much

more to it than that

They went to Hershey every year for many years and the search was always on for that elusive part. When it was found, the bargaining began and if the price was right, Iry bought it. Then, if you were his friend, he would be very generous when he found out that you needed a part that he had, often giving it to you. If you needed help. Irv was there with a depth of knowledge and parts supplies that would usually get the job done right the first time. something that is not always easy with our old Fords.

He was a collector. He was a specialist in items that were strictly Ford, like knobs for the dash board of practically every Flathead Ford built before the war. He was a key nut and had more keys, key blanks and cutters than you would ever need. Was Irv just an ordinary guy? Not even close. How many people do you know who collected "Kilroy Was Here" buttons? Irv was one, and he had a lot of them.

Iry restored a '36 Convertible sedan and a five-window coupe. He owned a '36 cabriolet, a '36 pickup that needed paint as well as a beautiful '42 convertible that was 90% restored. In other words, Irv was a Ford guy all the way. Beyond owning and restoring, Irv was the 1935 Ford Advisor for the Early Ford V-8 Club of America. For those of you who may not be aware of this, "National", as we call it, has an advisor for each year that flathead Fords were built. These folks have been selected because of their depth of knowledge of a particular year. They are available to help us with restoration problems. Trust me, they know their stuff.

There is another quality about Irv Warren that everyone passes on. He was a friendly, caring guy, one who will be sorely

Helen says to make one of these is easy and only takes a few hours. She explains that you start with a "granny square" at the center and work outward. She keeps working until the piece is big enough to lay over a lap. Hence, she uses the name "lap robe".

Since hatching of this idea for her "Aunt," Helen has made over 100 lap robes and donates her work to places which she sees can use them. She gives them in bundles of what she calls a "Baker's Dozen," thirteen beautiful and unique small blankets to keep the laps of the seniors warm, as they sit more often these days.

At June, Helen generously gave a "Baker's Dozen" to Gerry Blackwell for the seniors at Capri Villa, and gave me the same for folks at Sunrise Assisted Living. 
