


#### Car of the Month



Our Car of the Month for September as selected by Jerry Jensen and his committee, is Wendi and my '46 Ford Super Deluxe Fordor. It has a factory radio and heater, back-up lamp, outside mirrors and 600 x16 wide white wall Firestones.

As you all know, it has seen movie work and came to the September meeting in it's new black paint job. Here's the history:

It received a careful body-off restoration in California, perhaps the Santa Barbara area, in about 1988. At the time, it was painted dark blue enamel. The man who did the restoration had passed away and after changing hands a few times, Joe DiFatta bought the car. As always, Joe "DiFattaized" it. That means dual pipes with Smithys, an engine change and some accessory repairs.

It had been sitting for some time and was in need of mechanical work. The engine is a 59 AB rebuilt by Alan Mest in the late '90s. The engine that was in the car from the '80s has been installed in Jerry Case's '47 sedan delivery. Confusing huh?

Wendi and I bought the car from Joe in 1999 just as we joined the club. Over the last six years, we have installed Fryer water pumps and Andy's Radiator in Northridge rodded the radiator and flushed the block. It has a 4 lb. radiator cap and new 160 degree thermostats. We installed an electronic ignition, rebuilt the starter, replaced the fuel pump and had Ficken Wiper Motors do their magic on the old vacuum system. Much of the mechanical work was done with the help of the masterful Jerry Case and many parts have come to us through the capable hands of Dick Colarossi at CQ Auto Parts on Devonshire. The front end, including new king pins, bushings and tie-rod ends was rebuilt by Bill Chisholm at Vanowen Brake and Wheel.

The car is a movie star courtesy of Chuck Shubb. It stared in "The Man Who Wasn't There" with Billy Bob Thornton in 2002. It was a detective's car in the 1947 murder mystery with about 5 minutes of actual screen time. It has just finished shooting "The Black Daliah Murder" with Josh Hartnet and Hillary Swank in which it plays a 1947 police cruiser. The studios painted the car

#### **FOOTHILL FESTIVAL OF CARS, 2005**



You may recall the interesting tale of Tommy Noonan, a handicapped employee at the Mission Hills Hospital. Finally there was the account of a mentally retarded greeter at K-mart. McCarthy has a way of finding these stories and writing them in a style that helps us to relate to the characters and their contributions to the lives of others. He is a truly compassionate

writer who inspires us all to see the stories around us more clearly and realize how many beautiful things happen to ordinary people.

Special thanks to Joe for finding us a "gem" and to Dennis for giving us an evening we won't soon forget. TP



#### What's Not Covered in Driver's Education

Most of us took Driver's Education and got a lot of good information from it for safer driving. A lot of us are great drivers and have a safety record to show for it, not having had a significant accident in hundreds of thousands of miles.

Yet, it is a good idea to read, from time to time about someone else's suggestions on the subject of safety. When I read the Battleborn (EFV8 Club, RG # 12, Reno, Nevada) Newsletter for August, Pete Harding's article, had some good ideas, which I summarized below. Enjoy!

A good driver is so smooth that nobody can see how it's done. That means steering and braking happen without any jerking and head snapping. Clutching and shifting, especially, are done without fanfare and unless someone is watching, they hardly know it's going on. For example, you steer into a corner or make a lane change by anticipating the move so that you take up the play in the worm and sector and the tie rods etc. before you make the move. Ease off on the brake before the car comes to a stop to avoid rebound. On our pre'49 Flatheads, feather the clutch so that you minimize the shudder that comes with transverse springs, torque tubes and wishbones. Our '32 – '48 drives are rugged, but hardly smooth or lightweight.

Look as far ahead as possible to anticipate conditions. Drive 100 feet in front of your car and farther as your speed increases so you're ready for other driver's moves whether signaled or not. Close behind a big rig is the worst possible place to be. Be ready for the unexpected. It doesn't happen often, but it will sooner or later. Even if you have the legal right away, it may be better to not insist on it.

THINK! DO NOT LET EMOTION CONTROL YOUR DRIVING. Do not push for the limit. Use that extra margin to save your butt. While it is not a good idea to drive faster than the posted limit, if traffic moves somewhat faster, and it usually does, it may be safest to travel at a similar speed. Despite this, you are still responsible for obeying the posted limit and could be cited. Speed enforcement varies and it might seem unfair if one driver out of many gets cited, but it does happen. It is NOT a good idea to be the fastest driver on the road. It's not a rule, but it is probably

black and put white vinyl on the doors, complete with LAPD logos. After the shoot, we replaced the windshield, the front and back window rubber and repainted the car with a black base coat / clear coat.

In this process, Jerry Case and I removed and replaced all the chrome and stainless which, it turns out, is a bit of a job on many post WWII cars like the '46 Ford. They seem to have a large number of small pieces of bright work stuck on with rusty clips and nuts just to frustrate people like me.

The car has been a lot of fun for Wendi and me. We have been on many long tours over the years including two runs to the gold country (Sonora in '02 and Placerville in '03) and any number of more local runs such as three trips to Solvang and several to

Escondido.



It has a 3:78 rear end, which means it can cruise at 65 well enough. We do own a set of 15" wheels with radial tires for the road. It makes a huge difference on long

trips because the modern tires don't want to follow the longitudinal cuts in the pavement. The car has never liked hot weather. However, the installation of the Fryer pumps with their ball bearings and much improved impellers seems to help. Well, it's a Ford isn't it? TP

a good idea to stay with the pack. Speeding citations can cause increases in insurance cost.

Driving is the ONLY important thing, not conversation or changing the radio station. When you talk to people, you are expected to look them in the eyes. But it doesn't work when driving. Watch the road, not your passengers. Safety, not their feelings, is what counts. Get there without problems.

Adjust to the car. Good drivers learn how each car handles. Early Fords have drum brakes and usually narrow bias ply tires that don't stop like a modern car. Anti-lock disc brakes and radial tires make a difference in stopping distance. Add it up. We need more distance to get stopped. Plan on it. Legally, the driver who hits the car in front of him is at fault even if the officer does not place the blame. Insurance companies always do assign fault that way. The more you are at fault, the more your cost of insurance may increase.

Use the headlights. Do not expect horns to do you much good. Learn from experience, your own and other people's. In other words, it's not smart to ignore suggestions like these.
