





Two (different) Days at the Petersen Museum

Day one by Tom Potter: It was Sunday, January 22nd. We all arrived at 9:30 at the top floor of the Petersen Automobile Museum on Wilshire Blvd. In all, there were about 20 flathead V-8s and about an equal number of other makes. Bob Zecher, for example, drove his La Salle coupe, a beauty from the 1936-7 era when GM was building a car line between the Buick and Cadillac to make sure every market niche was covered. *(continued next page)*

We were treated to Petersen hospitality that we have come to expect and appreciate. After lining up to pay the reduced fee of \$5, which included a docent led tour, in no particular order, we saw original cars from movies such as the Bat Mobile in two versions, the original Love Bug(VW), and a huge number of cars, which had belonged to what they call 'Princes, Popes and Potentates'. Some were strange such as a Land Rover converted to use as a parade vehicle for the Pope and some totally exotic and extreme one-off cars made for Maharajas in India.

One of the things the Petersen does best is vintage hot rods and hot engines which include a high percentage of flathead Ford V-8s, including V-8 60s that have been 'slightly modified' and look as if they are a little over their original 221 cu. in. with a whole lot more carburetion. One of the centerpieces that really grabs the attention is a 1932 Ford Salon. This is a show room that places 'new' 1932 Fords in a setting that would make any car buyer desperate to buy. Included were Ed Warnock's '32 red roadster pickup, and John Farrar's '32 three-window coupe. There were several sedans and the mirrors and draperies that would have been appropriate for selling Lincolns and Pierce-Arrows. It takes one back in time.

This event was sponsored by the Southern California RG #11 and included about 40 enthusiasts of their club and many others. It was a great day, one enjoyed by all who attended. Tom Potter

Day Two (2-17) by Dennis Keene: Since I am a member of Southern California R.G. #11, I was aware of the planned tour to the Petersen, but I was unable to attend on the scheduled day. I missed out on the free parking offered to those who drove a V8 on the tour and also missed the docent led tour. However, I was still able to get the \$5 senior admission rate, and I enjoyed a crowd free self-guided tour by visiting the museum on a weekday. I couldn't help but notice how many '32 Fords were on display in addition to those in the "new" car showroom. It's a testimony to the popularity Deuces have had since their introduction in the middle of the depression.

John Farrar has owned his three window coupe since, at age 14, he traded in a 1930 Model A tudor at Dales used cars in San Bernardino and got a \$70 credit toward the \$150 price of his Deuce. For those of you who ran out of fingers and toes, that's a total of 53 years and counting.




John Farrar's '32 Deluxe Three window coupe in the "New" car showroom, with a Deluxe Tudor sedan in the background.

Ed Warnock found his pickup in Azusa in 1967. The owner had inherited it from his father and while in high school had painted it purple with white running boards. When the 4 banger engine quit running the truck was stashed in his parents garage, but it became expendable when the son wanted to sell the house. During Ed's high school days and thereafter, Ed owned 3 Deuce tudors and a roadster he acquired in Pennsylvania, so the pickup was Ed's 5th Deuce. Its restoration was begun in 1973 and the first outing was in 1975 at the Western National Meet – Colorado Drive. It received its 1st Dearborn Award in '81. At that time, 4 cylinder vehicles were not eligible for Best of Show, even though it had the highest point total at the meet. It did however earn the Grand Tour Award, it won its class, the driving contest, and also was picked for Ladies Choice. It was featured in the Hotel Lobby at the Western Regional Meet in 1982 at Olympia, Washington.


