



Mary's '36

This is Mary's 3rd '36 Ford rumble seat convertible and this cabriolet happens to be the best un-restored convertible I have ever seen. The '36 cabriolet was purchased new in 1936 by a man living in Covina, California. He drove the car from Covina to Pasadena where he worked. The car was his main transportation for three years. In 1939 he bought a new '39 4 door convertible.

The man in Covina had a 4 car garage, 2 wide and 2 deep. The '36 cabriolet soon got packed in the rear portion of the garage, where it was covered with household stuff. The car sat in that garage until the early 80's, when Ervin Warren went to look at a '39 4 door convertible for sale. He just happened to notice the household stuff that completely covered the '36. He asked if the '36 was for sale. The man said, yes, it was, but he had not gotten it out of its hiding place. Ervin bought the '36 cabriolet and left the '39 4 door convertible in the garage.

Ervin installed a factory '36 columbia overdrive and had the 21 stud motor overhauled. He also installed many accessories on the car, but he did not do anything to the body and upholstery. The door panels and the seat frame are still original although the seat had been recovered. The car still has mechanical brakes and they worked good. The body, frame, and floor had no dents or rust. All 4 of the fenders had very small dents in them, which were easy to repair.

On February 1st 2006 the decision was made to restore this very original car. The straw that broke the camels back was when our fat cat "Charley" jumped up on the top and fell through. The top material was rotten and would not hold old Charley. I was not going to put a new top on a car that needed to be restored.

As of this date, March 20, 2006 the frame has been sandblasted and painted. The floor has been sandblasted and painted back to the original color "Lite Fast Maroon". The body and fenders have been stripped to bare metal and primed.

Now it is time to prep and paint and a whole lot of assembly. We hope to have the cabriolet ready for the Western National Meet held August 7th -11th in Tacoma, Washington.





Guide Dogs of America Tour - May 9, 2006

A 'May Grey' day couldn't discourage 16 V8ers who gathered at Woodley Park for a "Lets Play Hookey" tour to the Guide Dogs of America facility in Sylmar. Assembled in the meeting room to see a video narrated by Brad Garret, we had a chance to meet Lori, a very mellow Black Labrador retriever. We all got to introduce ourselves to Lori, whereupon she went to the front of the room, reclined on her back with all four in the air, and quietly dozed.

We learned that originally most guide dogs were German Shepards, but now they are predominantly Labs, followed by Golden Retrievers and lastly German Shepards. The program includes breeding of the puppies, turning them over to volunteer families, at two months old, who raise them and acclimate them to the world until they are 18 months old. At that time they return to the facility for formal training and after being matched with their sight impaired masters, they get a four week "get to know each other" session with their new owners, who board at the site. The services receive no government funding and are supported by private donations and volunteers. Check out their website for more info. and current activities www.guidedogsofamerica.org/.

Following a tour of the grounds, the group retired to a local Fiddlers Three Restaurant for lunch. 

In Memory of Shell Harriman

I met Shell Harriman in the early part of 1970 at South Gate Park where the Southern California Early Ford V-8s had their meetings on the first Sunday night of every month.

We used to travel from Ventura to South Gate every first Sunday in a 1940 Ford convertible to go to those meetings. It was always exciting to go to the Early Ford V8 meetings because there was a good showing of Early Ford V8s. In those days there were just 1932 through 1940 vehicles in the club. Shell's black 1932 Victoria was always there. I can remember when Shell had 2 black 1932 Victorias. One of them had a chevy in it, but not for long! Shell converted it back to a flathead V8. Shell always liked his early V8s like Henry made them with "Flathead Power".

Shell joined the San Fernando Valley V8's in 1976 and he kept his membership in So. Cal. RG, so belonging to both groups made him a dual member. The Valley meeting was a lot closer drive for us, but if you wanted to see lots of old Fords the So. Cal. meeting was the place to attend.

After joining the Valley V8's Shell became club Secretary. His column always started out with "Secretary Sez". His articles always had a lot of V8 humor in them. That's when I really got to know Shell Harriman. He was not only a Stanford graduate with a Master's Degree, but his V8 humor was compared to the late great Bob McCoppin, also known as 'The Grease Pit Poet'.

Some time in the early 80's Shell moved to Camarillo and he joined the Ventura V8s where he also served as club Secretary and so the Ventura version of "Secretary Sez" appeared in the Ventura RG's newsletter 'The Steering Column'.

In the 90's Shell joined the Romeo Club which is a bunch of retired guys driving their antique cars to lunch. 'Romeo' stand for 'Retired Old Men Eating Out'. While Shell was in the Romeo club he managed to get four Early Ford V8s restored: '32 6-wheeled Roadster; '32 Phaeton; '40 Coupe and a '32 Victoria.

Shell drove his '32 Victoria many miles on tours even taking her to Canada. He would not drive Brand 'X'.

A good buddy we will miss him for a long time.
