

Greetings: Well, there's much brewing in the future, hereabouts. Some interesting club outings in the works. These will be more fully covered in their respective sections below. I would like to mention now,however, an alarming development on the State Legislative front. I was attending the San Fernando Valley Model A swap meet yesterday at the Rancho San Antonio Boys School, where I was approached by Dave Bryan, Director of the Association of California Car Clubs. He was passing out notices dealing with the existence of a piece of legislation (AB616) in the State Assembly which, if passed, will require all cars (as they become 15 years old) back to 1976 to pass annual smog checks. The money generated would go to fund the California scrappage program to buy these vehicles and have them crushed. Since these vehicles already must pass a smog check every two years, this constitutes harrassment, as well as being unduly discriminatory against this group of cars and their owners. Dave's flier goes on to point out that the Air Resources Board considers, on a regular basis, how much pre 1975 cars pollute. (Hopefully, they've not spent much time behind an idling flathead.) Since AB616 has already passed the Assembly and is now before the Senate, it would be a good idea for all of us to contact our respective State Senator (check the Government section in the front of your phone book or go to www,leginfo.ca.gov) and express your opposition. The bill's author is Dave Jones, "D" Sacramento. He's an agent for the ARB. His phone number is 916-319-2009

Of Interest:

MY FIRST V8

I have been driving since I was ten years old and working on a farm during WW II. My Grandfather was a barn builder and had a contract to build a huge three story barn near Birmingham Michigan. It was a large working farm and he got me a summer job helping out. The first thing that I ever drove was a 1939 Ford 9N tractor with a small trailer that was to be filled with corn. They had three of the Fords and someone showed me how to drive one. Quite a thrill for a ten year old! They also had a '39 GMC COE stake truck that I got to drive occasionally. My father was a Navy pilot during WW II and was transferred all over the US training other pilots and our family moved many times. I attended 13 different schools before I finally graduated from high school in Anaheim. When my father was discharged from the Navy after the war he bought a Mobilgas station in Long Beach. I was always interested in cars but that was really fun to be able service many different makes every weekend. The gas station did not last too long but I got jobs in other stations in Long Beach during my early high school years. I worked all summer and saved up enough money to buy a new Whizzer motor for my bike. My BankAmericard still says "member since 1947" Bank tellers must think that I am in my nineties! That was real freedom for a ninth grader in Junior high school. I really had fun with the Whizzer but in the 10th grade someone else liked it too and it was stolen never to be seen again. Just two years ago I found one of the new re-made Whizzer 's at Carlisle still in the shipping crate. Well, it is still in the crate but I will enjoy it again one of these days. I really did not know how to drive but when a customer came into my gas station with a 1935 Plymouth for sale for \$50.00 I had the money and bought it. I knew that at that time anything that ran was worth at least \$100. I drove my new car around and around the gas station at night when the boss went home. I was afraid to tell my father that I had bought a car as I had no license. It was not long before I was to turn sixteen and on my birthday I was at the DMV and got my license. That car was real fun and a great learning experience, It sure took a lot of abuse. I got a great deal on a new paint job for it and the painter asked me if I wanted blue or green. I did not realize it until afterward that the two colors were left over paint from other paint jobs. One bucket turned out green and the other blue! I had chosen the blue and it did not really look too bad. I can not imagine what the green looked like. That Plymouth lasted until someone made a quick left hand turn in front of me and I broadsided it. Well, his insurance company gave me the huge sum of \$125.00 so I was a rich pedestrian. I spotted a 1937 Ford coupe on a used car lot on Signal Hill. The asking price on the windshield was \$125.00 but the car had a smashed grill and was missing the left rear fender. It must have been the owner that I talked to because after grinding the price as much as I could I ended up getting the car for \$25.00 I think that they really wanted to get rid of it or me! There was a really neat old junk yard on Signal Hill and I got a good used fender and tail light for \$5.00 and a little more for a nice grill. I got the fender on with my crescent wrench but I was not as lucky with the grill and had to get some professional help to install it. I was really proud of that car and drove it everywhere. I got pretty good trying to adjust those cable brakes that changed their mind on a weekly basis. The car did burn oil and I was ok running around Long Beach but when we moved to Anaheim I continued to finish the high school semester in Long Beach. It burned a couple of quarts of oil daily and I found a gas station in Anaheim named "Kickapoo Joy Juice". They had a drain oil barrel in the back of the station and I would stop there every morning before school and get a couple of quarts of who knows what? That worked for several months but one morning I was late for school and did not fill up. Half way to school I threw a rod and that was the end of my first Ford. We towed it back to Anaheim and I sold it for \$25.00 to a guy who made a jalopy racer out of it. I never forgot that first Ford and that was to be the beginning of a real love affair with old Fords and memorabilia that has lasted more years than I care to count! Gordie Chamberlin
