



Show of universal appeal

Celestial-themed jewelry exhibit illustrates 'march of cosmic time.'



There are thousands and thousands, to paraphrase the ite Carl Sagan, the great popularizer of stronomy whose enthusiasm has guidd Knack's decades-long support of the hillith Observatory.

Celestially themed objects dangle on the celling of her residence in Maliu. They hang on the walls and adorn the cantelpiece, couches and chairs. They re embedded in the soil of her garden and stacked in the cupboards of her itchen.

And more than 2,200 of them — pieces if jewelry shaped like crescent moons, nultipointed stars and radiant summirsts — are displayed in an undulating ine along a 175-foot wall at the observaory. Known as the Cosmic Connection, he one-of-a-kind exhibit represents a

timeline of the universe, all 13.7 billion years from the Big Bang to the present.

The collection, amassed over more than two decades from swap meets, junk shops, discount stores and garage sales, is a testament to one laywoman's devotion to "public astronomy" — the idea that reliable information about astronomy should be accessible to everyone.

A celestially themed timeline, even one made of costume jewelry, she says, allows people to reconnect with objects in the sky and perhaps inspires them to ask important questions: Why are we here? What is an individual's place in the vast universe?

Griffith Observatory has held a special spot in Knack's heart since her first visit in 1950, when her family traveled from Washington state to see relatives. After moving to Southern California in the early 1960s, she often went to the observatory. Knack said she would take dates there as a test, to see "whether they could be interested in something a little loftier."

Knack, who was married to actor Pernell Roberts for 25 years, characterizes her interest in astronomy as a "guided obsession." It is a fascination that has driven her to sniff out sheet music with [See Celestial, Page B8]



Editors Notes Ford-60 it started it all--My 2nd Evolution Theory

Well picture that it is a little after WW11 and that aircraft company in San Diego decided to use the talents of their aluminum craftsmen to make a midget racer. That was a cool time, you just call up and order a racer and payed cash(I don't think plastic was invented yet, we had stuff called celluloid). It was like a modern day IKEA--some assembly required. The veterans were back and went nuts over Midget racing. Up until this time it was not a low budget sport. If you didn't have a Offenhauser you did not have a chance and they were high priced. Well along came the realization that the little Ford 60 would fit into the same cubic displacement category, and "Bang" the race was on(pun intended.) Lets face it the Ford 60 was a poopy idea, low horse power down from 85 horse, nobody with warm racing blood wanted to go down in horse power. There were Little Ford 60 engines stacked up every were, and cheap too. So the young lads started soupin up the 60s. Ishkidiarn did cams, somebody else made special pistons, every body had a grinder and ported and relieved every thing. In the engine world a brother that worked for Offenhauser saw there was a big market for high compression heads and manifolds for the 60, so he split off and started the Offenhauser Accessories Company you see today, In time the motor company was bought up and faded away. In this time period Frank Kurtis of Glendale, CA. took a look at all those Midgets and designed a much better suspension and chassis. This new concept slowly squeezed the fellows in San Diego out of the market as they just wouldn't change their design.(gota love, big company politics) Alot of the Midgets were handmade and few were ever alike. Kurtis wanted to focus more on new sales for big and little race cars and didn't like repairing his cars, so Zeke Justice (who was Frank Kurtis' first employee) saw an opportunity and he and brothers started the JUSTICE BROTHERS Company and proceeded to repair race cars. Now lets look at the big picture here. You can not just repair race cars and not race them to see if you did good. (their car won the Indy 500 in 1950, ------they must have done good). I have wandered from my subject a bit, sorry. Here you are racing, and everybody is using cams and High compression heads (14 to 1)and who knows what else(secret fuel?) and that poor little 60 is under a bit of a strain to say the least. In the poorer days, there was the favorite pastime of waiting for the race to end and run around the track and pick up pistons and rods for your next rebuild.(HO! Ho!) Now any racer will tell you that the fastest car in the race is not the regular winner. The regular winners are those that can hold their cars together through the prelims and still finish the main without exploding. This is where the Justice brain kicked into gear. If every body is running up past the top limits, there could be an advantage if you could lessen the friction in the motor and gear train, that would result to more energy to push you forward and still be in the legal cubic displacement that you claimed you were aiming for. (another HO!HO! who ever got caught?) The Justice brothers developed anti friction products that would help the engine and gear train to last. The point here is if ZDDP loss is in your research agenda, may I humbly suggest you look into the J-B product called HEAVY DUTY VEHICLE LUBRICATION ADDITIVE HDV-23p) It cost about \$8.50 for 15OZ(I think) You only need 3 OZ for our 85s' and it treats the metal not the oil. If you happen to be in the Justice Brothers Museum ask for a friction demo, you eyes will pop at what they show you. They say "Life is a bowl of cherries, but I think there is more fun in the pits.
