Speaking of the V8 Times I am going to repeat a quote that you should clip out and hide in your file for "how to tighten a head on a flathead and the gasket to use".

If you are torquing a 7/16 head bolt to 70 ft/lb., you should torque to 30 all around then 50- then 70. If it is a 1/2 bolt torque first to 40-60-88-100. The author Dick Flynn says to coat all four surfaces with copper gasket coat and use a fiber gasket not copper. Also he says (which is a shocker to me) don't use Ethylene Glycol anti-freeze (Prestone) because if it leaks it will wreck your bearings and it will attack aluminum heads. (who knew?) **Use Propylene Glycol.**







The Four Goldberg Brothers

The four Goldberg brothers, Lowell, Norman, Hiram, and Max, invented and developed the first automobile air-conditioner. On July 17, 1946, the temperature in Detroit was 97 degrees.

The four brothers walked into old man Henry Ford's office and sweet-talked his secretary into telling him that four gentlemen were there with the most exciting innovation in the auto industry since the electric starter.

Henry was curious and invited them into his office. They refused and instead asked that he come out to the parking lot to their car.

They persuaded him to get into the car, which was about 130 degrees, turned on the air conditioner, and cooled the car off immediately.

The old man got very excited and invited them back to the office, where he offered them \$3 million for the patent.

The brothers refused, saying they would settle for \$2 million, but they wanted the recognition by having a label, The Goldberg Air-Conditioner, on the dashboard of each car in which it was installed.

Now old man Ford was more than just a little anti-Semitic, and there was no way he was going to put the Goldberg's name on two million Fords.

They haggled back and forth for about two hours and finally agreed on \$4 million and that just their first names would be shown.

And so to this day, all Ford air conditioners show -- Lo, Norm, Hi, and Max -- on the controls.

CHARCOAL BRIQUETTES

(FROM THE MEADLINER)

Henry Ford gets the credit for developing the charcoal briquette. In the 1920's, he was determined to find a use for the piles of sawdust and wood scraps from producing Model T wood parts. He had the company develop a process to turn the waste into something useful. The scraps were charred, ground, mixed with starch and compressed into briquettes.



A relative by marriage of Henry, E.G. Kingsford, selected the site for the operation. By the late 1920's, the plant was producing 100 tons of briquettes a day for sale to meat and fish smokehouses, foundries, and tobacco curing plants.

In 1932, Ford plant engineer Walter Stoepple experimented with packing briquettes into cardboard boxes to create a kind of "instant campfire." By 1935 Ford Charcoal Picnic Kits and bags of Ford Charcoal Briquettes were on sale at Ford showrooms and hardware stores all over the USA.

In 1951, investors bought the plant and set up the Kingsford Chemical Company and relabeled the briquettes accordingly.

Today, Kingsford (a division of the Clorox Company), is the largest maker of charcoal briquettes in the world. They produce a billion briquettes a year at their Parsons, West Virginia plant.
