

<u>Gas</u> written by a person in a position to know what works because that's his job. Please note the <u>Tips</u> elsewhere in these pages. Each item may provide only a small saving, but when all items are followed, the beneficial effect is measurable.

One of the things I found as I accepted my role as vice president last year was that there was no known repository for the records of our regional group. And that situation persists today. When I became President I was unsuccessful in finding a local copy of the charter from the National Club which authorized the official implementation of our local Valley V8s club Regional Group 40. 
TIPS ON PUMPING GAS

I don't know what you guys are paying for gasoline.... but here in California we are paying up to \$3.75 to \$4.10 per gallon. My line of work is in petroleum for about 31 years now, so here are some tricks to get more of your money's worth for every gallon:

Here at the Kinder Morgan Pipeline where I work in San Jose, CA we deliver about 4 million gallons in a 24-hour period thru the pipeline.. One day is diesel the next day is jet fuel, and gasoline, regular and premium grades. We have 34-storage tanks here with a total capacity of 16,800,000 gallons. Only buy or fill up your car or truck in the early morning when the ground temperature is still cold. Remember that all service stations have their storage tanks buried below ground. The colder the ground the more dense the gasoline, when it gets warmer gasoline expands, so buying in the afternoon or in the evening....your gallon is not exactly a gallon. In the petroleum business, the specific gravity and the temperature of the gasoline, diesel and jet fuel, ethanol and other petroleum products plays an important role. HALF FULL. The reason for this is the more gas you have in your tank the less air occupying its empty space. Gasoline evaporates faster than you can imagine. Gasoline storage tanks have an internal floating roof. This roof serves as zero clearance between the gas and the atmosphere, so it minimizes the evaporation. Unlike service stations, here where I work, every truck that we load is temperature compensated so that every gallon is actually the exact amount.

When you're filling up do not squeeze the trigger of the nozzle to a fast mode If you look you will see that the trigger has three (3) stages: low, middle, and high. You should be pumping on low mode. thereby minimizing the vapors that are created while you are pumping. All hoses at the pump have a vapor return. If you are pumping on the fast rate, some of the liquid that goes to your tank becomes vapor. Those vapors are being sucked up and back into the underground storage tank so you're getting less worth for your money.

Another reminder, if there is a gasoline truck pumping into the storage tanks when you stop to buy gas. DO NOT fill up: most likely the gasoline is being stirred up as the gas is being delivered, and you might pick up some of the dirt that normally settles on the bottom.



They have known each other for 25 years. John lived his early years in Hollywood where his Dad had a market. Then they moved to the Valley where he graduated from Van Nuys High School. He had a '35 Ford flathead engine before he even had a car. He put it in a red wagon and walked it down to Ventura Blvd. [10 blocks away] to have it fixed. Not quite sure I heard this right, but I thought he said he took an engine on the street car to Edelbrocks. He still did not have a car of his own so he put his engine in his friends car and drove 100mph. He went to the street racing Wed. night on Sepulveda on his bike. There was a lot of drinking so he drove the drunk drivers home in their car, he doesn't remember what he did with his bike. He gave ration stamps he got at Dad's market to teachers and also traded food rations stamps for gas stamps. His Dad locked the garage so he couldn't get the car to go to the dry lakes. He had to keep changing engines back and forth to go racing or go to school. The Highway Patrol came to a race and John took off with them chasing. He ran out of gas and hid until 3am, then got a friend to tow him home. He went to Korea where he was changing spark plugs

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for a helicopter in 0 degree weather. So he was frequently sitting in a van warming his hands. They didn't like that so they moved him to another job. The army was sending parts to Japan to be fixed so he washed and fixed the parts and could do no wrong. He got to fly or drive all over. He took off for two weeks to visit a friend and when he came back they never said a word. Virginia said he was working on his car one hour before their wedding. It took him three hours to clean off the limburger cheese friends

He worked for a service manager named Tom who got very upset when John would go to his Mom's for a two hour lunch. They called in Tom who quit and John was offered the job. John and the assistant manager would cover for each other. He has a world record in boat racing. Wayne Thompson, from boat racing kept blowing up engines, so John built one for him and he won a lot of races. He had a blue '40 and a burgundy '40 coupe. The blue was a parts car that he bought for \$50. He used the parts on the burgundy car, then got more parts for the blue. He was 16 when he kept hanging out at Harold Johanson's place. He was told not to but kept coming back until they were friends.
